At the afternoon session Mr. Huntingtonhouse, of Chicago, formed a class and instructed them in the features of the "Chaутаquа Square," the new set dance adopted by the convention of last year.

The evening session was chiefly taken up with the election of officers, which resulted in the selection of William H. Hogue, of Manchester, N. H., as president; A. C. Wirth, of Chicago, first vice president; R. F. Thuma, of Pittsburg, second vice president; Monta Beach, of Dallas, Tex., third vice president; W. G. Huntingtonhouse, of Chicago, fourth vice president; E. W. Masters, of Boston, secretary; James W. Bangert, of Baltimore, treasurer; Mrs. H. Maria Robbins, of St. Paul, trustee for three years; A. Bohlander, of Peoria, Ill., trustee in place of A. C. Wirth, who was elected first vice president.

It was decided to award R. G. Huntingtonhouse a medal on the merits of the Chautauqua square dance adopted at the previous convention. The new dances exemplified yesterday were acted upon at the session of this morning, after they have been exemplified by the several authors. There are many pretty and pleasing combinations presented in the proposed new dances, the points of which have been given to a committee. Another matter to come before the convention this morning is the redistricting of the country over which the several supervisors will have charge.

A decided social feature of the convention will be inaugurated this evening. It will be a party given by Mrs. H. Maria Robbins, of this city in her academy in the Grand opera house. The affair will be most enjoyable. The delegates are getting along with their work with rapidity and will devote part of each day during the remainder of the week to visiting the resorts and points of interest about the city. Minnehaha Falls, Fort Snelling and the lakes will be inspected by the visitors.
