Low summer tourist tickets to Eastern points now on sale. Omaha, Neb., June 18.—In railroad circles it is believed that E. McNeill, general manager of the Iowa Central, is shortly to become receiver of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company.

McNeill was at Union Pacific headquarters today, and left for Portland this afternoon. He carries with him a bound volume of the orders made in the Union Pacific case, in order, possibly, to familiarize himself with the duties of a receiver and the action taken by the circuit court in a multiplicity of matters brought to its attention by the receivers of the Union Pacific.

While nothing is known at Union Pacific headquarters regarding the intention of the bond and stockholders of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company, it is generally thought that the bill asking for a separate receiver will be filed July 1, on the day the default in the payment of the December interest takes place on the part of the Union Pacific.

The bill was drafted to file the bill June 15, but conditions arose which prevented the consummation of Messrs. Daugherty and Cook's recommendation, and the bill was in the Columbia country may have had something to do with the withholding of the bill until July 1.

JUDGE TOURGEE AROUSED. The Eminent Stalwart Condemns the Machine Methods of Republicanism.

New York, June 18.—Judge Albion W. Tourgee, the distinguished author and stalwart Republican, who has been most prominently mentioned for the Republican congressional nomination in the Thirty-fourth congressional district in this state, has withdrawn from the candidacy.

He has written an open letter to a leading Republican in the district that will be published in this city tomorrow, and therein he presents in detail his reasons for this action, and enters an emphatic protest against the present monopolistic spirit of the party to which he has long and so powerfully given his adherence.

Judge Tourgee says: "In withdrawing my name as a candidate for the Republican nomination I

desire as a citizen and as a Republican most respectfully and earnestly to protest: 1. Against the suppression and elimination of the distinctive principle of the party, equal rights and free opportunity for all men, and the re-establishment of the old Whig party under its better name.

2. Against making the Republican party a silent party of the South, and democracy in taking away the rights of citizenship from those it cost so much blood and treasure to redeem from slavery and plague with inalienable rights. 3. Against the forbidden them. Fortunately for liberty and justice, God has made the permanent protection of American industry impossible, except through the protection of the rights of American citizenship.
