### FOURTH AT WHITE BEAR.

CELEBRATIONS AT EVERY POINT  
ABOUT THE LAKE.

ATHLETICS AND FIREWORKS.

Also Balloon Ascensions and Para-  
chute Leaps—Picnics at All  
Points Between the Village—  
Hon. D. W. Lawlor Will Make  
a Fourth of July Speech—  
Great Day.

The arrangements are now complete  
for the picnic and patriotic celebration  
to be held on the Fourth at White Bear  
lake. During the day a picnic will be  
given at Park place under the auspices  
of St. Mary's of the Lake church. The  
grounds will be decorated with flags  
and bunting, and in the evening, with  
electric lights and Japanese lanterns.  
Beneath its shady bowers tables and  
benches will be spread out all day before  
the multitudes, and refreshments  
served by the ladies of the parish. The  
White Bear band will play patriotic  
airs from 10 a. m. until 10 p. m.

The great event of the day will be the  
choir exercises at the grand stand in  
Railroad park, commencing at 11 a. m.  
A splendid chorus of voices will render  
appropriate selections, and will be ac-  
companied by an orchestra.

The Declaration of Independence will  
be read by Gen. John B. Sanborn, of St.  
Paul, and the orator of the day will be  
Hon. D. W. Lawlor, of St. Paul.

A splendid programme has also been  
prepared by the citizens, which will be  
held in the park and \$300 in cash prizes  
are offered for the different events,  
which are as follows:  
Foot race, 100-yards dash, free for all;  
wheelbarrow race, fat men's race, lean  
men's race, 100 yards; sack race, 75  
yards; potato race, bicycle race, pony  
race, pie-eating contest, catching greased  
pig, climbing greased pole, boys' foot  
race of 100 yards, three-legged race.  
Coxey's army will march at 1 p. m., and  
promises to afford much amusement. At  
1:30 o'clock Prof. Paul will make a bal-  
loon ascension and parachute jump, and  
at 5 o'clock Mile. Pauline will make a  
parachute jump. In the evening there  
will be a grand display of fireworks.

At Lake Shore, Stein's great union  
band will give a concert from 2 to 10  
o'clock p. m. The toboggan slides, driv-  
ing platform and sleighing platform will  
be in operation all day. At 3 o'clock the  
High School club will cross bats with a  
nine from Stillwater at Ramsey park,  
and in the evening there will be dancing  
at the pavilion.

At Dellwood the White Bear Yachting  
association will hold a regatta, com-  
mencing at 2:30 o'clock. A special St.  
Paul & Duluth train will leave the  
union depot, St. Paul, at 1:30 p. m.,  
running through to Dellwood without  
change of cars.  
At Maitomell the Boys' Brigade of  
the House of Hope Church will enjoy  
their annual outing, and the Young  
People's Society of the First M. E.  
Church of St. Paul will also picnic  
there. In the evening there will be a  
display of fireworks at Hotel Maitomell.  
At Wildwood Seiber's band will  
give a concert, and the Pickle club will  
hold its annual outing, and in the evening  
Manager Livermore promises a good  
display of fireworks. Dancing at the  
pavilion will also be a feature of the day.

Special trains will be run on the St.  
Paul & Duluth from Stillwater, Minne-  
apolis and St. Paul to White Bear lake.  
The St. Paul & White Bear road will  
also provide extra trains, leaving East  
Seventh power house every half-hour.

### CAPITOL NOTES.

The state librarian has received the  
laws of Utah for 1893.

J. C. Pope, county auditor of Kanabec  
county, called on the attorney general  
yesterday.

Secretary Beebe has sent out \$3,700,  
\$1,500 of which is for soldiers' relief and  
\$2,200 for support.

Prof. J. A. Vye will assist in the  
state department of education during  
the session of the summer schools.

The state medical board will begin an  
examination of candidates for licenses  
to practice medicine in Minnesota at  
the capitol today.

The Cash Grocery Company of Du-  
luth, with a capital stock of \$15,000, has  
filed articles of incorporation with the  
secretary of state.

Articles of incorporation of the Cot-  
tonwood Norwegian Evangelical Luth-  
eran church were filed yesterday in the  
office of the secretary of state.

The quarterly meeting of the state  
board of corrections will be held at 10  
o'clock this morning at the office of  
Secretary Hart, in the capitol.

J. C. Rochester state hospital, yester-  
day filed an expense list for special in-  
surance appropriation with the secre-  
tary of state. The amount is \$20,888.

Lucius Stephenson, of Superior, Wis.,  
yesterday filed notice with the secretary  
of state of the appointment of W. M.  
Hamilton, of Duluth, as his attorney.

The Security Bank of Zumbrato, with  
a capital stock of \$20,000, filed notice  
of organization with the state bank  
examiner yesterday. F. M. March is  
the cashier.

The Globe Fire Insurance company,  
of New York, and the Profit Sharing  
company, of Minneapolis, were licensed  
to do business in this state by the in-  
surance commissioner yesterday.

The Duluth Street Railway company  
has filed with the secretary of state a  
city-year 5 per cent mortgage for  
\$2,500,000, given the Manhattan Trust  
company, as trustee, to secure a bond  
issue and take up some old bonds.

Gen. Mitchellberg is in receipt of a  
letter from the professor of military  
science and tactics of Fordham college,  
New York, stating that Michael A.  
Byrd, of Jackson street, is one of the  
three graduates of that school this  
year, and that he passed a most credit-  
able examination in the above subjects.

### ON TO WASHINGTON.

Three years ago the only authentic  
map of the Virginia battlefields was  
prepared in the War Department for  
the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Com-

sold in business, but it has been re-issued  
for the occasion of the K. of P. Encamp-  
ment at Washington in August, and

Cincinnati, O. In connection with the  
map is also a description of the grand  
and varied scenery of the Virginia,  
and the delightful Mountain and Sea  
Shore resorts along the C. & O., as well  
as a sketch of the battlefields.

feats.


The park board having met the de-

### CELEBRATE THE FOURTH.

MINNESOTA BOAT CLUB GIVES ITS  
ANNUAL REGATTA.

PROGRAMME AT COMO PARK.

Temperance Celebration, With  
Speakers of National Repute—  
Picnics Galore—Pickle Club  
at White Bear—Will Be the  
Most Stirring July 4 For Sev-  
eral Years.

The glorious Fourth will be cele-  
brated more extensively by St. Paul  
people than for several years back.  
There will be picnic parties galore.  
Nearly every social organization in the  
city will celebrate in some way. One of  
the great events of the day will be the  
annual regatta of the Minnesota Boat  
club on the river. The Twin City Rapid  
Transit company has prepared a special  
programme of events at Como park,  
among which will be balloon ascension  
and parachute drop, judging by a cele-  
brated company of Japanese, and va-  
rious other performances. The tem-  
perance element will have an elaborate  
celebration in the midway district, at  
which speeches will be made by ex-  
Gov. St. John, of Kansas, and other  
celebrated orators. At White Bear  
there will be boat races, base ball  
games, and a multitude of amusements.  
In the evening there will be elaborate  
fireworks, both at St. Paul and  
White Bear. A large number of St.  
Paul people will also enjoy events at  
Minnetonka.

### THE REGATTA.

The Minnesota Boat club is making  
active preparations for its annual  
Fourth of July regatta. It was sug-  
gested to the club to hold the regatta at  
Lake Como this year, but the idea was  
abandoned by the committee in charge.  
The races will therefore, as usual, be  
rowed on the river, opposite Raspberry  
island.

The first race will be called promptly  
at 10 a. m. All boat races, excepting the  
quarter-mile dash, will be half a  
mile with a turn, the start and finish  
being immediately opposite the boat  
house. This arrangement will make  
the races more interesting to the spec-  
tators than heretofore, as they will have  
the contestants constantly in view.

grove on Mississippi street. One of  
the best brass bands in the city will fur-  
nish appropriate music during the day.  
Refreshments will be served at popular  
prices; and there will be a variety of  
attractive games and prize sports. The  
grounds are spacious and commodious,  
and the Mississippi street cars will stop  
at the main entrance. No pains will be  
spared to make the day enjoyable for  
all who attend the picnic. Everybody  
welcome. Admission free.

Among the many celebrations of the  
Fourth will be the annual picnic to be  
given by St. James' church under the  
direction of the pastor, Rev. James A.  
Fitzpatrick. The picnic grounds are  
situated in the beautiful grove on the  
banks of the Mississippi just across

games and attractions will be had to

to the grounds.


The Germania Turnverein will cele-
