As predicted in the Globe, the comptroller has carried his "not legally organized body" theory into the joint court house and city hall committee, and paved the way for refusing to pay the janitors and elevator men in the public building.

When the secretary called the roll the name of Assessor W. H. Johnson was among the number. Mr. Johnson arose immediately after and said he wanted to know why the clerk had called his name and had not also called the names of Aid. Milham and Lindahl in place of those of Johnson and Johnson.

Mr. Johnson responded to the inquiry by stating that the joint committee had the right to seat members of the common council nominated by the president of the assembly.

Mr. Johnson then waved his hat at Messrs. Milham and Lindahl, who followed him out of the room.

Mr. Johnson said that under the circumstances he would withdraw from the committee. He wanted it understood that he did it on good feeling, but only done to save a point argued upon after taking advice on the subject.

Mr. Ehrmanntraut suggested that Mr. Johnson might be relieved of any embarrassment by the committee reconsidering its action seating him.

CORN NOT A POOR CROP. Damage From Drought is Said to Be Exaggerated. OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 3.—The Burlington today issued what is regarded as an accurate estimate of the crop situation in Nebraska, South Dakota and Northern Kansas, through General Passenger Agent Francis. He says:

It is encouraging to note that the damage done to the corn, especially along the lines of the E. & M., is not nearly so serious as reported. The terrible heat and long absence of rain in the different corn belts, of course, gave a bad outlook for the growing crop; still the experience has always been that the first reports received are usually exaggerated, and they have been no exception to the rule this year.
