THE FIGHT IS NOW ON

Echoes of the Lindstrom Convention Cause the Republicans to Think.

A WELL BUILT PLATFORM.

Democratic Veterans Will Help the Young Men to Victory.

A GERMAN COUNTY TICKET.

No Less Than Six Teutons Slated and Some Must Be Slaughtered.

Local Republican politics seem very quiet on the surface, but around and about inner circles of the "main guys" there is considerable scheming, all of which is, of course, "on the quiet." This is particularly true since the Lindstrom convention took place.

Ed Darragh is now the candidate of the Democrats of the Fourth congressional district, and the platform upon which he stands is constructed without a single plank in it which will give way.

The resolutions adopted at Lindstrom seem to have struck a responsive chord throughout the entire district, and though they are not yet thoroughly disseminated they will work and grow, till on election day they will bear the fruit of a victory for the young Democrats who listened to the advice and counsels of the veterans who helped shape the course and outline the plan of battle.

It is quite likely that the outcome of the convention at Lindstrom will in one way or another affect the county ticket. As the Republican slate stands at present it is too thoroughly honeycombed by the German element, there being no less than five Germans contemplated for positions.

The ticket above mentioned does not, however, include all the ambitious Germans. The twilight slate-makers overlooked one of the most important factors of the party and one who has done yeoman service in many battles, even though the voters who are called in the ticket will be a battle of the Germans that will create a split a mile wide.

Some one must be sacrificed, but who shall it be? Bob Seng says he is in a state, and that he doesn't care whether Charlie Keller wants it or whether he deserves it or not. Keller has had two chances, and that is enough. But, on the other hand, Keller says he will go into the convention and make a fight, and it is quite likely that he will make a red-hot fight, too.

Otto Keuffner, of the Eighth ward, must be taken care of, for he made such a gallant fight last spring. And he did not make it for the admiration prize and simple, but what there was in it in the future. He is entitled to a place, and will probably get it, though it will make many a Republican heartache and create many a breach in the big Eighth ward.

Henry Weeber has been a candidate so often and set aside so often by promises that it is simply suicide to set him aside and not to have him. He has many friends and they say he must have a chance, and the ticket this fall or they will fall out of the ranks of the faithful.

Jensen and Willrich have been strung along the Republican line so long that they both think they are ripe to pluck, and that this is the best chance they should be garnered. They have held honorary positions and have been complimented by honorary mention, but now they want results and something more substantial. Both may be called, but neither may be chosen.

This is the way the Republican slate stands at present, and the names of the Germans who will be wiped off remain to be seen. But it can be taken for granted that if some of them are sponged away the balance of the slate will be smashed into smithereens.

A SCIENTIFIC SERMON. DISTINGUISHED ORATOR OF BROOKLYN Entertains the Mental Scientists With a Sermon of Rare Merit.

Rev. Frank E. Mason, of the First Church of Christ of Brooklyn, N. Y., lectured on "The Law of Opposites" before the Christian Scientists in Globe building, yesterday morning.

His sermon was unique and iconoclastic in nature. He dealt with orthodox and unorthodox alike, and his logical diction of the "fall of man," claiming that concession to this ecclesiastical assumption perpetuated the phenomena of the "fall." He said:

"It is impossible to regenerate man so long as we maintain his decadence. He is a creature of the past, and his only hope of regeneration consists in mentally establishing the spiritual foundation, in consciousness. Sickness, sin and death are not of God, and will pass away as the spiritualization of the thought. Jesus Christ is the perfect model of individuality and perfection. The power and prerogatives which individual men belong equally to all, are relegate to futurity that which would remain in the present, and herefore the discords of our own negative thoughts. Intelligence is the savior of the soul, and the only way to the light is through the darkness of the devil. The same mind in us that was in Christ Jesus will resurrect us to His realization of the true manhood."

Superintendent Warren, of the Eastern Illinois railway, was telling the other evening of a certain engineer in the employ of the road who had been repeatedly cautioned against running too fast. He was running a freight train, and on one portion of his division there was a steep hill. His orders were to never permit his train to go down that hill faster than fifteen miles an hour, but it was general belief that whenever he had a safe opportunity he sailed down that grade just as fast as wheels could turn. One day he did go down the hill so fast that the train left the track at the bottom, and there were several cars piled up in a chaotic confusion immediately followed, and the engineer, in railroad parlance, was put on the "carpet."

POLICEMAN ARRESTED.

CHIEF CLARK SPEAKS ON SPECIAL OFFICERS.

Specials Called in Because of Their Uniforms and Other Reasons.

Chief of Police Clark, in speaking yesterday of the so-called "merchants' police," called the attention of a Globe reporter to an article appearing in a morning paper under the caption, "But-But-called in." "I am not a merchant," said Chief Clark, "but I have called in the buttons, etc., of Joseph Walsh, of the merchants' police, who did duty in the circus hill district. It is true, and I was justified. You see these specials are uniformed exactly like regular members of the force, even to helmets, buttons, stars, etc. Frequent complaints have come to me of these specials being drunk on duty, and I have seen some of them in that condition myself. The public is unable to distinguish between these men and the members of the regular force. I was compelled to do it to protect the regular force from an unjust and untruthful accusation. Joseph Walsh, who was supposed to be on Circus hill Saturday night doing the duty for which he drew his salary, wandered quite a distance from that point. In fact he was found in the hill district between 2 and 3 o'clock Sunday morning by Sergeant Zirkelbach and Officer Newcomb in an intoxicated condition and he was in a quarrelsome mood. They arrested him, brought him before the police court, and placed him under the charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct. He is still here."
