Department of Dakota Marksmen Use Rifles With Good Effect.

EXCEED ALL FORMER SCORES

The Team Work of Last Year Beaten by Over 400 Points.

DAVIS WINS GOLD MEDAL.

The Five Men Who Will Go to Sheridan—Other Sporting Events.

Fort Knott, Mont., Sept. 23.—The rifle competition for the department of Dakota has been concluded with skirminish firing, and the result is beyond all expectations. The scores of the winning team of ten exceed those of last year by 433 points, and the scores of all the competitors are far above those of preceding years. The team was mainly made in skirminish firing. The winner of the gold medal, Corporal William J. Davis, Company A, Twenty-fifth Infantry, made 581 points, or 36 more than the winner in 1893. "LONG LIVE THE EMPEROR"

Shouts the Iron Prince in Closing His Impassioned Address.

Berlin, Sept. 23.—Fifteen hundred ladies and gentlemen from West Prussia today visited Prince Bismarck at Varsen. The visitors grouped themselves in front of the prince's residence, and when the ex-chancellor appeared upon the veranda, he was most enthusiastically cheered. The ex-chancellor made a long speech to his visitors, in which he dwelt upon the Polish question, reviewing history, legislation and other matters pertaining to the subject. He expressed his approval of the speeches delivered at Konigsberg and Thorn by Emperor William, and said he saw in that proof that West Prussia was in no danger from the Poles. He added that he could only feel that the emperor shared his sentiments that the iron prince and his party was at party revolution, which they must combat.

"God keep the emperor," the ex-chancellor concluded, "in this feeling and give him counselors ready and able to carry out his majesty's programme. In this hope I desire to join my voice in the cry of 'Long live the emperor.' God keep him."

Dr. Egbert on the Simile of Leaven Used by Christ.

ITS TRANSFORMING POWER. Leaven in Meal Brings New Life out of the Substance.

GOD'S KINGDOM IS LEAVEN.

Men Without This Leaven, Though Good, Cannot Be Christians.

Rev. John Paul Egbert yesterday morning at the House of Hope, preached from the following text: "The kingdom of God is like leaven, which a woman took and hid in three measures of meal, till the whole was leavened."—Matt. xiii. 33.

"The kingdom of God is like leaven," said one of the many illustrations of Christ's power over the common figures of speech that men have spoiled, lost the meaning of, and Christ has given them a resurrection into new and enduring life by the way He has used them. Elsewhere in the Bible leaven is used to signify "leaven of the leaven of the Pharisees" is hypocrisy. The Old Testament church, however, the time of the Passover, required every household to take a bitter herb and to eat it with unleavened bread, and in every part of it make search for any leaven which might be found, and for the time of unleavened bread was at hand. Christ took this figure, as He did many another, and stamped it with His own super-scription, passed it into the current speech of the world as a coin of divine value.
