GEN. BECKER AT HIS BEST.

Advocates a National Currency of Gold, Silver and Paper.

OVATION AT LITCHFIELD.

Candidates Greeted by an Immense Crowd in Meeker County.

HUTCHINSON, Minn., Oct. 19.—The Democrats of Hutchinson had their enthusiasm raised to a high degree today by the presence of George L. Becker, John Ludwig, Charles A. Lambert and John J. Ryder, who addressed the people for an hour and a half. Mr. Lambert talked German with good effect. He was followed by Mr. Ryder, who dealt the Republicans some hard blows and braced up Democrats in a vigorous manner, not forgetting to compliment Gen. Becker. Mr. Ludwig then spoke English, holding the Republican party responsible for the past business prostration, and had a few Republican senators shown enough love of country to take the place of a few recalcitrant Democrats, the tariff legislation would have been all that Democrats promised. Gen. Becker was the last speaker. He enunciated Democratic principles as laid down by Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence, which established a government of the people for the people. He had not patience to talk of protecting the tariff, through which the Republican party had legislated money out of the pockets of the whole people to put it in the pockets of a few people. He advocated a currency of gold, silver and paper to be issued direct by the government, based on the credit of the faith and credit of the government, and regulated by congress. The meeting had a fine effect, and Gen. Becker's candid manner was especially impressive.

GRAND LITCHFIELD MEETING.

Candidates Have an Ovation in Meeker County.

LITCHFIELD, Minn., Oct. 19.—A grand audience, made up of men of all parties and extending even beyond the limits of the biggest hall in town, greeted the appearance of Gen. Becker in Litchfield tonight. The Democratic leader drove over to this town from Hutchinson. In the party, besides Gen. Becker, were John Ludwig, Charles A. Lambert, candidate for state treasurer, and John J. Ryder. From the moment Gen. Becker emerged, after a hasty supper, he was forced to hold an impromptu levee for the reception of old friends and well-wishers. He was virtually the founder of Litchfield, having laid out and given the town its name. At the hall J. Ryder opened with a virulent speech on the essential difference between Democracy and Republicanism. Gov. Ludvig followed with a pointed, sensible speech that won great applause. Mr. Ludwig is proving a good second to Gen. Becker, and his sturdy denunciations of Republican methods, his unique but forcible reasoning, always make a hit. Every day is adding to the confidence Gen. Becker feels in the result of the coming month. Tonight he was especially happy in his address. He not only analyzed state policies in incisive style, but discussed in a calm and lucid and convincing manner the most vital national issues.

"My mission is to the Democrats of Minnesota," said the general, and adding that he had made an impressive argument. The warm reception given to him here tonight seemed to fire him to an effort that was admirable in every sense. "Democratic principles are the same today and every day," he said. "The history of the Democratic party, when completely written, will be the history of the American republic. The political party which makes the most combats as to legislation for a particular class of our people will most surely disappoint its followers."

Gen. Becker presented in strong, earnest language the peculiar reasons why Democrats should this year stand by their own state ticket. In that way, he held, out the Democrats of Minnesota hope to defeat Knute Nelson and S. M. Owen. Throughout his talk Gen. Becker was encouraged by warm signs of friendship and interest, and at its close he was surrounded by scores of

BUDD ATTRACTS ATTENTION.

Reeve Making a Unique Campaign in North Dakota.

SPECIAL TO THE GLOBE. FARGO, N. D., Oct. 19.—North Dakota has a congressional candidate who out-Simpsons the sockless statesman of Kansas. In the Democratic convention some delegate jokingly proposed the name of Budd Reeve, the Sage of Buxton, as the congressional nominee. The joke was carried too far, and Reeve was nominated, though the action was immediately rescinded. Reeve then became the "anti-fusion Democratic" candidate by petition. He opened his campaign several days ago, speaking in Fargo last night. He is touring the state on horseback, the horse being presented by citizens of Valley City. It is shod with silver shoes, presented by Buxton people. Budd travels the country wrapped in a huge American flag, and on his shoulder perches an American eagle. Accompanying him is a Scotch collie dog, acting as master of ceremonies at his sage's speeches. Budd receives an average of 100 calls in his visits. The "oz marches at the head of the procession, wearing a banner on which is inscribed: "This animal is no politician, but he knows better than to fuse with animals antagonistic to his nature."

HE WILL BE CARDINAL.

Report That Sattoli Is to Be Promoted Confirmed at Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 19.—A clergyman of Cardinal Gibbons' household today confirmed the report that Mer. Sattoli will become cardinal. In addition to the fact that the archbishop will be made a cardinal is that he will probably be named as such at the next consistory. It is believed that the next consistory will convene in Rome, most probably in December of this year. Upon his being named a cardinal Mer. Sattoli will receive the red biretta, and be invested with his new dignity in the cathedral at Baltimore. What time will intervene after the ceremony of the investiture and Mer. Sattoli proceeding to Rome to receive the red hat at the hands of the pope is purely a matter of speculation. It may be six months, it may be a year, or even two years.

TO HEROES OF '76.

Tarrytown Monument Unveiled—Sailors and Marines Participate.


TARRYTOWN, N. Y., Oct. 19.—The memory of revolutionary heroes was honored today by the unveiling of a handsome monument to the memory of 76 soldiers from Tarrytown who fought in the war for independence. Today is the one hundred and thirtieth anniversary of the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown. The monument is erected in the famous Sleepy Hollow cemetery where Washington Irving is buried. Nearly all of the soldiers were dependent on the government. The Marine band led the parade, after which followed United States sailors and marines from the cruiser Cincinnati. The monument is a handsome structure, and is a fitting memorial to the heroes of '76. The unveiling was presided over by the Sons of Veterans, state militia, military cadets from the Cornell academy, fire companies of Tarrytown, school children, village trustees and a large number of citizens. A national salute was fired by the United States cruisers Dolphin and Cincinnati, which are lying in the Hudson off Tarrytown. The monument was unveiled by the Sons of the Revolution. Judge Mills delivered the oration.


