SHE AGREED TO HANG. Strange Case of Murder Charged to Hypnotism. SPARTA, Wis., Oct. 29.—Samuel E. Buxton, who was Saturday arrested on a charge of having murdered Mary A. Jones, a maid, at her home on a farm on this city on the 21st inst., where she was found hanging by the neck, has confessed the murder. His preliminary hearing was held this morning, soon after midnight, and he waived examination. He was immediately removed to Sparta, fearing he would be unable to stand the trial.

MOB FIRED FIRST. Col. Coit Reports on the Washington C. H. Massacre. COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 29.—Col. Coit, who commanded troops at Washington Court House, says in official report to Gov. McKinley: "At 2 p. m. a crowd some 30 large, so demonstrative and threatening I was unable to hold the guards at the outside of the house and draw them in, protecting from the steps the south and west entrances with small details, drawing the crowd toward the north entrance to the court house and to the jail, which was northeast from this entrance. At 3 p. m. leaders of the mob pleaded with me to let them overstep the guards, saying they would rush for the prisoner when brought to the jail. I was unable to get into the court house and had to kill all the troops to get him. I had seventy-six effective rifles. There were over 3,000 men assembled. When the prisoner appeared between military lines en route to the court house, the crowd called for the prisoner. Six military officers were ordered to hand control of the prisoner to the crowd. The troops used bayonets and shot. Dr. Taylor, military surgeon, was cut with a knife."

POSTMEN WIN THEIR SUIT. MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 29.—The United States court of claims today rendered judgment in favor of 108 letter carriers for time served in excess of eight hours a day. Out of the whole number, cases decided, 100 came from Chicago, 14 from New York, and 4 from Frederick, Md.

LYNCHERS' TRIAL GOES OVER. MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 29.—The trial of the members of the mob which lynched six negroes near Millington, Tenn., on the night of Aug. 21, was continued until Nov. 5.

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
