## DEAR SILENT CITY.

Sacred Memories Gathered From Sweet Old Oakland's Confines.

MEN OF OTHER DAYS WE SEE.

They Walk Our Streets Again and Thrill Our Hearts With Joy.

A STROLL WITH SKETCHES.

Recollections of a Few Who Fought St. Paul's Early Battles.

As a GLOBE reporter and his friend—an old resident—strolled through the large, handsome gateway of Oakland cemetery they came upon beautiful lawns that are yet fresh and green owing to the genial and pleasant fall. The oak leaves have turned yellow, and some of the trees are stripped of their summer suits entirely. On the beautiful monuments of various designs and colorings scattered thickly around we read the names of those whose feet once trod the busy streets of St. Paul, and whose faith and energy contributed to her growth—men who grew up with the city, whose every act and deed was for her prosperity, and who assisted greatly in making St. Paul what she is today—the metropolis of the Northwest.

Justus C. Ramsey. Close to the western edge of the cemetery the first monument that we noticed was a large slab of beautiful white granite, and after brushing off a few oak leaves, we read "Justus C. Ramsey, died in 1881." Here lie the remains of a man who came to St. Paul when it was little more than an Indian village. He worked and struggled and hoped along with the early settlers, through hard times and through good. He could be seen walking the streets with head erect and a kind and cheery word for each one that he met. He had a helping hand for all the old settlers and loved them so well that their very faults seemed virtues in his eyes. He would stop and listen patiently to the story that some old French settler had to tell. He would know just where his farm was and ask him about his family, calling each member by name. A few Indians, who still lived around Mendota after their tribe had disappeared, would make occasional visits to the city and always get a hearty welcome from him. Within hearing distance of the hum of the busy city which he helped to build he rested in peace and quietude; and if he receives half the forgiveness he to others gave, his after life is a happy one.

J. E. Thompson. We read on another monument of handsome design that J. E. Thompson died aged forty-seven years. His was a busy and useful life, and he and his brother Horace were the most prominent bankers in the Northwest for some time before, during and after the war, up to the time of their deaths.

Heziah Thompson has a handsome monument near by, the inscription upon which shows that he was born in 1825 and died in 1885. Besides being engaged in the banking business, he was deeply interested in the construction of the old Sioux City railroad. He died in New York city after a short illness, and his remains were brought back to the city he loved so well.

Charles Scheffer. A little to the north of these stands a monument surmounted by a beautifully carved figure in white marble. Upon it is the name of Charles Scheffer, who was born in 1825 and died in 1885. Forty years is a short while for a man to do the splendid mercantile record that he did in the wholesale dry goods business in St. Paul. All through the trying period of the civil war he never lost faith in the final success of the government or confidence in its cause.

Willis A. Gorman. We come next to a historical name. One who was governor of Minnesota when it was a territory, and afterwards colonel of the First Minnesota regiment. He was born in 1816 and died in 1876. His was an eventful and busy life—seeing, as he did, an encampment of French and Indians grow to be a city, and taking part in one of the greatest military struggles recorded in history.

H. H. Sibley. The inscription on another handsome monument shows that this well known general and last Democratic governor that Minnesota ever had, was born in 1811 and died in 1881. He came here a young lieutenant under orders from the government before St. Paul was ever thought of, and laid out military roads to the frontier posts. This whole Northwestern territory was then comprised in what was known as Wisconsin.

Norman W. Kittson. A short distance from Gen. Sibley's stands the monument of Norman W. Kittson, who had charge of the Hudson Bay Fur company's business. He would come down every year at the head of a long train of oxen loaded with valuable furs and camp on the tract now known as the Seventh ward. The general and he became fast friends and remained so up to the day of his death.

George L. Otis. The resting place of George L. Otis is marked by a handsome monument, the inscription on which reads that he was born in 1829 and died in 1883. The Democrats of Minnesota will remember him well as their candidate for governor, and the bar of Ramsey county will recall a member of ability and sterling integrity.

William J. Cullen. This name is carved on a large block of massive light-colored granite. The figures 1816 and 1870 denote the dates of his birth and death. He was a familiar figure to all the old settlers, and his children have all grown up here, K.

## STICK TO THE FARM.

## FARMERS ARE DOING BETTER THAN CITY PEOPLE.

### Foreclosures on City Property Much Greater Than on Farm Lands.

A short time ago the bureau of labor completed its tabulation of farm and other mortgages upon land placed on record in Minnesota between 1880 and 1890. The results have already been given to the public. The bureau has just completed the tabulation of mortgage foreclosures of twenty-two of the oldest counties, not including Hennepin or Ramsey. They are the same as Group 4 given in connection with mortgages, with the exception of Rice, not yet completed. The twenty-three counties including Rice had farm land in 1880 aggregating \$124,488,568, which had increased to the value of \$180,818,513,671. This increase in the value of the farms in these counties was 27 per cent. The farms increased in number from 46,607 to 48,504, or a per cent. The mortgages placed on record on the years 1880 and 1881 averaged, for farm property, in number 7,117, and in amount \$5,338,308, and for the two years 1888 and 1889 they were on an average of 5,484 in number and \$4,433,671 in amount.
