

BONDS IN DEMAND.

Bidders Willing to Take More Than Three Times the Amount of Issue.

BIG PREMIUMS OFFERED.

At Best Offers Proceeds Will Exceed Receipts of Former Bonds.

AWARDS TO BE MADE MONDAY

New York Syndicate Undoubtedly the Successful Bidder.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The bids for the \$50,000,000 bond issue recently offered by Secretary Carlisle were opened at the treasury department today, shortly before 10 o'clock. At 4 o'clock it was stated at the department that a hurried calculation showed that the total number of separate bids was 257, aggregating \$154,370,000. The largest bid was the syndicate bid of the United States Trust company, Drexel, Morgan & Co. and others, at 117.07 for the whole amount or none. This bid was the best offered, as the aggregate of bids above this figure was only about \$10,324,150, leaving about \$90,775,850 at a less figure. It therefore seems quite probable that the syndicate bid will be accepted, although Secretary Carlisle stated that he could not express an opinion as to the result until next Monday, when the awards will be made. According to the terms of this bid, the government will pay 2.875 per cent interest on the \$50,000,000, as against 3 per cent carried by the February issue. There is a possibility, however, that a close calculation will disclose the fact that there is a sufficient number of bids at a better rate than this, which, with the second syndicate bid at 116.888, or 2.899 per cent, may make a combination slightly more advantageous to the government than the other, although Secretary Carlisle stated that he could not express an opinion as to the result until next Monday, when the awards will be made. At no time during the bidding, however, did the issue have Secretary Carlisle's doubts that it would all be eagerly taken, and at satisfactory rates.

THE SYNDICATE BID.

Big Financial Companies Offer to Take All the Bonds.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—The main bid for bonds was by a syndicate of bankers of New York, London, Philadelphia and Boston, and was for \$50,000,000 at 116.888. The bidders included the Drexel-Morgan company, United States Trust Company of New York and the large New York banks. The \$50,000,000 bid provides that \$40,000,000 of bonds are to be delivered in New York, \$5,000,000 at Boston, \$5,000,000 at Philadelphia, \$5,000,000 at Chicago and \$5,000,000 at San Francisco. The bid is made by the United States Trust company, of New York; Drexel, Morgan & Co., New York; First National bank of New York, and Harvey Fisk & Sons. They add the information that the following parties are interested with them in the joint bid: Drexel & Co., Philadelphia; J. S. Morgan & Co., London; National bank of Commerce, New York; First National bank, New York; Fourth National bank, New York; National City bank, New York; Hanover National bank, Chicago; Mutual Life Insurance company, New York; Gallatin National bank, New York; Merchants' National bank, New York; Manhattan company, New York; Morton, Bliss & Co., New York; Heidebach, Jekelheimer & Co., New York; J. and S. Durborow, both legs severely bruised below the knee, not serious; Mrs. A. C. Durborow, right side cut, bruised about the body, not serious, taken home; Henry Mattison, gripman, severely cut. With the exception of Walters nobody was badly hurt.

A trial with a trace of the drug was found at his side this morning, and by this evening he had recovered sufficiently to talk. He has not yet stated why he took the drug.

A Costly Smoke.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 24.—August Schlicker, a laborer in the employ of the city, went into a fire cistern at Fourth and Main streets this morning with a lighted pipe in his mouth. There was an accumulation of gas in the cistern, and a terrible explosion followed. Schlicker was crushed to death.

HUNDRED LIVES LOST.
