

WOULD SLICE CHINA.

Japan, It Is Intimated, Will Demand Territorial Concessions.

NEGOTIATIONS FOR PEACE.

Will Not Begin Before Feb. 1--Mutu Will Represent Japan.

AFRAID OF THE POWERS.

Possibility of Complications With European Nations Feared.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Japanese newspapers recently arrived here continue to devote considerable space to the consideration of terms of peace with China. Some of them, assuming that Korea's independence will be acknowledged and that China will pay indemnity, assert the cession of the island of Formosa is of paramount interest to Japan. Public opinion, according to one of the prominent papers, seems to favor demanding the cession of the island of Formosa, as well as Formosa, the former being regarded as necessary to Japan in order to insure the independence of Korea, and the latter being equally essential for the security of Japan's naval defenses.

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PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

Are Not Expected to Begin Before Feb. 1.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Mr. Kurino, the Japanese minister here, says he expects that peace negotiations between the plenipotentiaries of China and Japan will begin about the first of February. His information is based on the Chinese peace commissioners left Pekin on the 7th, and he expects they will arrive at Hiroshima, Japan, in time to begin work by the first of the month. It is expected that Hon. John W. Foster, who is to assist the Chinese commissioners in the negotiations, will also be on hand.

NEAR TO AGREEMENT. Western Lines Strike the Inevitable Snag Again. Chicago, Jan. 12.—The committee of the Western road, having under consideration the troubles between the Atchafalpa and Southern Pacific were in session all day, and at one time were making such progress that they thought they would be able by evening to make an advance in the transccontinental and trans-Missouri rates. Later in the day, however, they struck a snag, and the meeting adjourned until Monday morning. The obstacle was of small importance, and there is a chance that it will be out of the way after the meeting again convenes. Chairman Caldwell, who is in New York laboring with the trunk lines on the matter of differential rates, has informed the Western roads that he has reached an understanding with the trunk lines so satisfactory that there will be no necessity for a meeting between the Western and trunk lines.

RATES DEMORALIZED. East-Bound Grain Tariffs Going to Pieces. Chicago, Jan. 12.—The demoralization in the east-bound rates still continues, and there is no immediate prospect of a settlement of the question. That the grain men were correct when they said that the tariff between Chicago and New York was prohibitive is proved by the statements of the shipments, which for this week will show a decrease of considerable proportions from the week preceding, and a heavy falling off from the same week of last year. As the matter now stands the rates will, unless speedy action is taken, become demoralized to the last degree. Shipments were openly taken today at 20 cents, and all the roads were talking them.
