

ADJUDICATES SINE DIE

The Supreme Court Hands Down Fourteen Unimportant Decisions.

AND IN FIVE INSTANCES

The Rulings of the Lower Courts Are Relentlessly Sat Upon.

THE COURT TAKES A REST

And Puts Over Until the General Term All Cases Not Set.

The supreme court, before adjourning yesterday, handed down fourteen decisions, all written by Justice Mitchell. Five of the cases are reversals, and in the remaining nine the judgments and orders of the lower courts are affirmed.

ORDER REVERSED.

St. Anthony Lumber company, appellant, vs. Earlwell, Robinson Co., respondent.

The contract construed and held that defendants were entitled to a fair average in quality of all the logs described in the contract as belonging to the plaintiffs in the mortgage.

MORTGAGED PREMISES.

William R. Travers, respondent, vs. Russell R. Dorr and Louise B. Dorr, appellants.

The mortgage conveys the mortgage premises subject to the mortgagee's land becomes, as between the mortgagee and his grantee, the primary fund for the payment of the mortgage.

MUST ACCEPT THE TENDER.

Bertha Rother, appellant, vs. John Monahan, respondent. Syllabus—A tender does not extinguish the lien of judgment, but if a judgment creditor wrongfully refuses a lawful tender of the amount of his judgment, and while the judgment debtor still holds the property, able and willing to pay the amount, persists in using his judgment for the purpose of redeeming the land of his debtor from a sale on a prior lien, his own act of judgment, is wholly in his own wrong, and the latter will set aside the attempt at redemption and compel the judgment creditor to accept the tender and satisfy his judgment. Order reversed.
