LOYALTY TO SEE OF ROME.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—St. Patrick's day, coming on Sunday, was celebrated in St. Patrick's church today with high pontifical mass by Mgr. Satoll and a sermon by Rev. Father Richards, president of the Georgetown college, on the worldwide work wrought by St. Patrick and the Irish race.

Mgr. Satoll was assisted in the service by Father Rooker, Sbaretti and a large number of local Catholic clergy. This celebration of the mass was accompanied by orchestra, choir and organ.

President Richards' sermon was notable in portraying the Irish race as God's chosen people of modern times, and the vessel subject was received again it is understood that many of the merchants who are particularly hostile to asphalt and brick have lately been won over to the former material.

However, Attorney Simpson is of the opinion that the assessment made last year for brick will not apply to other material. If the attorney's opinion is correct, and the council decides upon asphalt, the company taking the contract will have to wait another year for its money.

The assessment for paving Nicollet was made for stone curbing, and the council subsequently concluded to adopt artificial curbing. In the district where the Lechner road is being paved, the contract made for the stone curbing would hold even when the character of the material had been changed.

The city attorney dissatisfied from the contract of the court and expressed the opinion that the decision would be reversed in the supreme court, but no appeal was taken.

It is clear that the paving of Minneapolis' principal thoroughfare is a long ways from being settled yet.

WILL ASSUME COMMAND OF THE TROOPS IN MADRID AND FORM A CABINET. MADRID, March 18.—The ministers decided to resign at a council held this evening. Senor Sagasta subsequently went to the palace and handed the resignations to the queen regent, who accepted them.

WILL ASSUME COMMAND OF THE TROOPS IN MADRID AND FORM A CABINET. It is expected that Marshal Martinez de Campos will form a business cabinet. Senor Sagasta has declared that it is his intention not to resume the premiership. The Herald will tomorrow say that Marshal de Campos will assume command of the troops in Madrid before he forms a cabinet. Gen. Bermudez Reina, the military governor of Madrid, it will be recalled, resigned that position yesterday. The Herald will further say that while the council was sitting tonight a deputation of military officers presented themselves. It is not known whether the officers were summoned by Gen. Dominguez, the minister of war, or came of their own accord.

CAMPOS IN COMMAND. MADRID, March 17.—An explanation of the crisis is that, according to the military code, those who slander the army through the press ought to be tried by court-martial, when, according to the press laws, such matters ought to be tried by a jury in the supreme court. Despite this the minister of war, conforming to the desires expressed by the officers of the garrison, proposed to the cabinet that a court-martial be summoned to try the cases. A majority of ministers representing the civil elements opposed this procedure, whereupon Prime Minister Sagasta declared that it was impossible for him to continue longer in office. All the ministers then tendered their resignations. Marshal Campos assumed command of the garrison tonight.

BETTER TONE. American Securities Doing Better in London. LONDON, March 17.—The Chinese, Tasmanian and other securities, during the week to make money somewhat harder.
