TO A FRENCH CELL.

Ex-Consul Waller, Sentenced in Madagascar, Has Been Transported.

HE LANDS AT MARSEILLES.

Sentenced to Twenty Years on Charges of Being a Spy.

BIG CLAIM FOR INDEMNITY.

Washington Authorities Will See the Case Thoroughly Investigated.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—A telegram from Marseilles says: "The steamship Djemnah, from the island of Madagascar, has arrived here, having on board John L. Waller, formerly United States consul at Tamatave, who, as exclusively announced by the Associated Press at the time, was recently tried by court martial and sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment on the charge of having been a spy in the interest of the Hovas."

While this action on the part of the French in removing ex-Consul Waller from Madagascar to France will only add to the

AMOUNT OF INDEMNITY

It will be called upon to pay, should Mr. Waller's friends show that the charge upon which he was sentenced is baseless, it will still facilitate the efforts of the department of state to fully develop the facts in the case, as it can now communicate directly with United States Ambassador Eustis, instead of being obliged to adopt the tedious course of acting through an inferior consular officer in Madagascar, out of reach by cable communication. Mr. Eustis has been instructed to pursue the matter to the end and make a most thorough examination of the legality under treaty stipulations of the trial of a citizen of a friendly nation by court martial instead of by the regular civil tribunals, as is customary, and perhaps absolutely essential. Moreover, the case may involve the right of France to exercise jurisdiction over the internal affairs of Madagascar, from which she appears to have been expressly excluded by the treaty of 1885, which gave her only jurisdiction over the foreign relations of Madagascar.

The Washington friends of Mr. Waller are bringing all the influence possible to bear in his behalf upon the state department. Among other prominent men who have displayed an interest in the case is Senator Voorhees, who has had one or two interviews with Secretary Gresham, and has presented to him in a strong light the importance as well as the propriety of the United States investigating the question of Waller's treatment. After seeing the secretary, Senator Voorhees said he had found Mr. Gresham quite as much interested in the case as he was, and disposed to have it

The secretary stated that he had already placed in the possession of Ambassador Eustis all the facts that had come to his knowledge, and he had given him instructions to thoroughly investigate the case. There can be no doubt that the Waller incident will prove to be one of the most difficult that this administration has had to contend with in its treatment of foreign affairs, and that this fact is fully realized here. The principles involved are of the most importance, and should the statements of Waller's friends be well founded, the government of the United States under the present circumstances can admit the correctness of the action of the French officials without thereby admitting its indisposition or inability to protect our citizens in foreign countries from oppression and ill-treatment. An interesting question which has arisen at this stage is what has become of Mr. Waller's concession. He had an

ABSOLUTE GRANT

of about two hundred miles of most valuable lands in Madagascar, abounding in rubber trees and other tropical products which he had partially arranged to market. It is well known here that every effort had been made to dissuade him by other holders of concessions who desired to seize upon these lands. But, so far as the facts are known Mr. Waller obtained this concession in a perfectly legitimate manner and his title must be protected.

Our government has uniformly held, notably in cases arising in Central America, that an American citizen cannot be dispossessed of a concession so long as he complies with its terms, but that the government where it may be situated. The rule of international law is clear as to the preservation of the individual's title in such cases, and having laid down this doctrine in our relations with the weaker nations of this continent, the state department can scarcely do less than maintain it as against France. The information reaching Washington gives the details of the charge under which Waller was convicted as a spy. The French soldiers had determined to make a descent on one of the large Hova towns. It was to be a night attack, and was intended to be a decisive stroke. The arrangements for the move were guarded with the utmost secrecy. In some way, however, Waller learned of the French movement, and he set to work to convey full information to the Hovas. The latter quickly armed the threatened town, so that when the French
