SUCCESS OF THE VAUDEVILLES AT THE METROPOLITAN OPERA HOUSE.

STOCK COMPANY REMAINS.

IT OPENS ITS SUPPLEMENTARY SEASON WITH 'YOUNG MRS. WINTHROP.'

BENEFIT FOR MR. KINGSBURY.

Attractive Programme Prepared—'Hoy's A Black Sheep' and 'The Willbur's Coming.'

The last week but one of the summer season of the Alhambra Vaudeville at the Metropolitan begins to-night. Two more weeks of vaudeville, and then the season of six weeks, which was originally arranged for, will be closed. It is perhaps not generally known that it costs much more money to present a vaudeville performance than it does to offer almost any other kind of a show, for the salaries paid specially artists are exceedingly high, on account of the scarcity of first-class people, and the increasing number of vaudeville theaters in the Eastern cities. During the summer season in St. Paul Manager Giffen has paid as high as \$50 a week for one act alone, and with this sum the whole salary list of an ordinary dramatic company could be paid. The total salary list of the Alhambra has ranged from \$1,200

to \$1,500 a week, and the expenditure of this amount of money for a performance which is given at exceedingly low prices is indeed a venture deserving of success. For the week beginning tonight, the management offers a bill equal, if not superior, to any yet presented. The star of the new company is Gertie Cochran, a child of four years, who astounds the public with her wonderful exhibition of memory. She answers all sorts of questions on the Bible, history or any other subject rapidly and correctly. Gertie has appeared at a number of the leading theaters in the East, and her performance has proved such a wonder that she is now drawing one of the highest salaries paid for a vaudeville act.

Popular Pete Baker, who has starred in German comedies for a number of years, is on the Alhambra bill for the week. This is his first appearance as a vaudeville actor, and he will introduce an original German character act. Another big card on the new bill is Bernard Dyllin, the well-known baritone singer, formerly with Russell's Comedians and Donnelly and Giffen's company. Mr. Dyllin has a voice that combines beauty and power, and his singing always makes a distinct hit. The Lavinos will appear in their unique sketch, entitled "The Rival Arts," introducing vocal and instrumental solos and duets and some clever portrait painting. A share of the fun in the new programme will be contributed by Leo and Chapman, who will present a rural gymnastic sketch, which is said to be very comical. Schaffer and Clark will play on twenty-six different instruments. Nicholas S. Murphy will sing and Joe Hardman will contribute his mirth-provoking monologue. The usual daily matinees will be given at 2:30, and the curtain will rise at 8:30 in the evening.

EXTENDED ITS SEASON.

The Stock Company Will Remain With Us a While Longer.

The Giffen and Neill stock company will not leave us after all. This is most welcome intelligence for it cannot be denied that this admirable organization has at last met with the recognition it so richly deserves, and the St. Paul public can ill afford to part with so capable an aggregation of players. As announced in yesterday's Globe, the stock company succeeded in canceling its Baltimore engagement, and thereupon Managers Giffen and Neill signed the contract with Manager Kingsbury of the Grand for an indefinite season at the Grand. The length of that season will depend upon the patronage of the St. Paul public. Should it equal that of the last two weeks, several more weeks of dramatic delectation are in store for our theatergoers.

Owing to previous arrangements, whereby the stock company is to give a performance in Minneapolis tomorrow night as a testimonial to Manager Kingsbury of the Bijou theater and a benefit performance Tuesday night, the supplementary stock season will not open until Wednesday afternoon. Upon that occasion the stock company will appear in Bronson Howard's beautiful domestic drama, "Young Mrs. Winthrop," and will present this play during the season.

The core of "Young Mrs. Winthrop" can be pertinently described as lack of domestic love; this gentle and necessary quality of married affection has been sacrificed by the man to his business interests. He has violated, all unconsciously, the sanctity of domestic devotion to his wife by dragging pure-proven thoughts over his threshold, even to the exclusion of their child. The wife interprets it into neglect; she feels satisfied that he is vain of her to grace his hospital, but she yearns for the simple love of man for woman; not for the cold, metallic, unmeaning kiss of a business compact. Social scandal occurs, when Buxton Scott, an old attorney who has known them both in youth, by ingeniously recalling some of the vivid incidents of their childhood, arouses boyish and girlish fancies for the moment. Eventually he succeeds in bringing about a complete reconciliation.

The play will be cast as follows: Douglas Winthrop, a man of business, Neill; Constance Winthrop, his wife, Kate Blanche; Mrs. Ruth Winthrop, his mother, Carrie Strong; Mrs. Dick Cretwyn, a lady of society, Gertrude Crossman; Buxton Scott, a lawyer, Mr. Perry; Dr. Melbanks, Mr. Morris; Herbert Winthrop, cousin of Douglas, John B. Maher; Edith Chapman, sister of Constance, Anne Blanche. The scenes are all laid in New York city and the time is the present.

Liesen, Frank Werner, Otto Dreher, St. Howard, all the parts will be taken by the younger class at this performance with the exception of E. J. Giesen, the well known basso, who will take the part of the Burgomaster, the same part which he took with such success twelve years ago. The overture commences at 8 o'clock sharp.
