CONGRESS OPENS WITH THE USUAL HURBUH AND CONFUSION.

JUBILANT REPUBLICANS.

REED ACCORDED A GREAT OVATION ON TAKING HIS FAVORITE SEAT.

ORGANIZED AND ADJOURNED.

Both Houses Hold Short Sessions—The Message to Be Delivered Today.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—The house of representatives passed today into the control of the Republicans, and Thomas Brackett Reed, of Maine, triumphantly assumed the speaker's gavel. The opening season was, as usual, an animated and brilliant occasion, set off with crowded galleries in holiday attire; intoxicating with the perfume of hundreds of floral tributes to popular members, and pervaded with the spirit of jubilation and good nature. Old, familiar faces were absent, but there were plenty of new ones to take their places. Still, the proceedings themselves, as is usual with the opening sessions, were of a routine character and devoid of interesting or sensational features. The house simply organized, adopted the usual resolutions to notify the president and the senate that the house was ready for business, and wound up by indulging in the biennial lottery, or seat-drawing contest. Speaker Reed was beyond quantity in the galleries on the occasion. His appearance was the signal for a most flattering and enthusiastic demonstration. His inaugural was modest and full of good feeling, but non-committal as to policies. However, it was not expected that the speaker would touch the question of the deal with the house. Ex-Speaker Crisp assumed the leadership of the minority, and it was significant that Mr. Payne, of New York, made the motion to adjourn, which usually devolves upon the leader of the majority. This is taken as a sign that he is to be chairman of the ways and means committee and the recognized leader of the Republicans on the floor.

CLEARED THE FLOOR.

By 10 a. m. the marble corridors were thronged with sight-seers and place-hunters, and before 11 o'clock the galleries, public and private, were packed to the doors. From the galleries the visitors looked down upon an animated but confused scene on the floor. New members, old members, ex-members and place-seekers chatted in groups and filled the hall with a roar of voices. On the speaker's table were great bunches of American beauty roses, tied with stemmers of red, white and blue, and other floral pieces. Flowers were conspicuous on the desks of various members. At 11:45 the floor was cleared, and those who had not handled the flag before the house retired and sought at the thronged doors of the galleries an opportunity to get a glimpse of the proceedings below. In the press gallery every seat was taken by correspondents of the great dailies of the country. At that time the speaker took the oath to the speaker's desk pointed to 12 Col. "Ike" Hill, the deputy sergeant-at-arms, lifted into its place on the green pedestal, alongside of the rostrum, the ebony, eagle-surmounted mace, the emblem of the house was run up, and Clerk Kerr called the Fifty-fourth house of representatives to order.

DRAWING FOR SEATS.

An arrangement was entered into by which the Republicans should have a first tier of seats on the Democratic side and also the last two tiers. Three hundred and fifty seats had been reserved for a box and shaken up, and a blindfolded page drew out the balls and the members selected their seats as their names were drawn. According to the usual custom, the house granted the ex-speakers, Mr. Crisp, of Georgia, and Mr. Kern (Pop., Neb.), John C. Bell, of Colorado. The names of both Mr. Reed and Mr. Crisp were vigorously applauded by the respective party associates.

Messrs. Hopkins (Rep.), of Illinois; Loud (Rep.), of California; Erdman (Dem.), of Pennsylvania, and Catchings (Dem.), of Mississippi, were appointed tellers, and the roll was called. The constitution requiring the election of speaker by viva voce vote. All the Republicans voted for Mr. Reed; with one exception all the Democrats for Crisp, and all the Populists for Mr. Bell. The exception was Mr. Crain, a Democrat from Texas, who, when his name was called, voted for his colleague, Mr. Culberson, of Texas. The result of the vote was: Reed, 234; Crisp, 95; Bell, 6; Culberson, 1. Mr. Kern's announcement of Mr. Reed's election was greeted with a thunder of applause.

Messrs. Crisp, Grosvenor and Bell were appointed a committee to conduct the speaker to the chair, and soon appeared at the main entrance. Mr. Reed, leaning on the arm of ex-Speaker Crisp, and Messrs. Grosvenor and Bell arm-in-arm. As they moved down the center aisle the house rose en masse. A roar of applause followed, the galleries joining with great enthusiasm in the demonstration. As Mr. Reed ascended

ed the rostrum the roar swelled, until it was deafening. Above this volume of sound came like pistol shots cries of "Reed, Reed, Reed." The Republicans cheered, many of them wildly, and the ladies in the galleries waved handkerchiefs. For every minute the demonstration continued.

THE CZAR SPEAKS.

Mr. Reed, arrayed in a long frock coat and wearing a dark four-inch handkerchief, stood calmly and serenely, with his hands clasped in characteristic fashion behind his back, until the house was quiet. Mr. Harmer (Rep., Pa.), the oldest member on the floor, then presented a continuous and administered the oath of office to the speaker. The latter then turned to the house. Looking into the sea of upturned faces, he delivered his inaugural.

"It will not be unbecoming in me, I hope, if I acknowledge to this assembly that it is very agreeable to me to stand once more in the place which I left four years ago. Of the past, however, I shall not speak, for the past speaks for itself in terms more fitting and appropriate than any words which could come from my lips. Nor shall I speak of the future, for we are not putting off the harness, but putting it on. Yet I think I may venture to say of the future, in the light of the past, that if we are anything which for the moment seems inadequate, it may be that time, which has justified itself for us on many occasions, may do so again. Those who have acted with wisdom heretofore may be fairly expected to act with wisdom hereafter. It is not without reason that the pleasure associated with the honor which has bestowed upon me, an honor which no American citizen can fail to appreciate and for which I give thanks, is but for the moment, while the cares and responsibilities of the office are many. So far as the performance of my duties affects the whole people of the United States, I invoke their considerate judgment. So far as it affects the members of this house, I ask from both sides of the chamber that cordial co-operation, without which I cannot hope to succeed, assuring them that no effort on my part will be spared to aid them in the performance of their duties by that entire impartiality which is their just due."

TAKING THE OATH.

At the conclusion of his speech the members came forward in squads and their names were called and with uplifted arms swore to support and defend the constitution against all enemies, foreign and domestic, and faithfully discharge the duties of their office. This proceeding occupied over half an hour. Unanimous consent was given that Mr. Nowlands, of Nevada, and Amos J. Cummings, of New York, whose credentials had not arrived, should be sworn in. Accordingly Speaker Reed administered the oath to those two members. The cause of the officers of the house nominated by the Republican caucus Saturday were then formally elected, the Democrats presenting the names of the officers of the house, and the Republicans presenting the names of the officers of the house. The speaker then read the ordinance of the house, followed by Alexander B. McDowell, of Pennsylvania, as clerk; B. F. Russell, of Missouri, as sergeant-at-arms; William E. Glenn, of New York, as doorkeeper; Joseph B. McHenry, of Ohio, as postmaster, and Henry B. Coudin, of Michigan, as chaplain.

The customary resolutions were then adopted, notifying the president and the senate of the election of Mr. Reed and Mr. McDowell as speaker and clerk, respectively, and on motion of Mr. Payne (Rep., N. Y.), a committee, consisting of Mr. Payne, Cannon (Rep., Ill.), and Crisp (Dem., Ga.), was appointed the speaker to join a similar committee from the senate to notify the president that the house had organized and was ready to receive any message that he may have.

At this point the first political clash occurred. Mr. Cannon and Mr. Crisp crossed swords on the former's motion that the rules of the Fifty-first congress be adopted for the guidance of the house. Mr. Cannon and Mr. Dingler explaining that the house was without rules and that the adoption of the rules and the adoption of the temporary rules for the guidance of the house until the committee on rules reported. STARVATION THREATENS AMERICAN MISSIONARIES AT HARPOOT.

FUNDS MUST BE CABLED.

ALREADY SUFFERING FROM WANT AND SURROUNDED BY DANGER.

SULTAN IN A FIT OF TERROR.

In Constant Fear of Losing His Throne—Czar Gives Him Little Relief.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Rev. H. O. Dwight, missionary of the American board at Constantinople, today cabled from Philadelphia, Turkey, to the Christian Herald, New York, as follows: "Recent news from Harpoot, Harpoot missionaries telegraph starvation imminent."

The Christian Herald adds: "This message from Dr. Dwight has a peculiar significance, as it discloses the fact that the missionaries at Harpoot (whose mission buildings were totally destroyed during the recent massacre there) are themselves suffering the pangs of hunger and cold, probably as severely as the Armenians." The Christian Herald will forward to the missionaries by cable, free of expense, all sums contributed for the relief of the sufferers in Armenia.

SIGNAL FOR HOLY WAR.

Rev. Van Meter Appeals to the World to Stop Bloodshed.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—Rev. H. H. Van Meter, who prepared the missionary manifesto "bearing on the origin of the Chinese outrages," has completed another on the subject of the Armenian massacre. He intends to have translated and published in every newspaper in Germany, Russia, France, Austria and Italy. He says: "The Armenian massacre in Armenia are merely Mohammedan massacres to which the bloody Turks would commit all mankind not Moslem. The cause of the Armenian massacre, therefore, is not one of any particular race, but of humanity at large and of political and religious liberty. Neither the Moslems nor the Christians are to be held responsible for fraternal relationships, should be permitted longer to prevent or delay the powers from fully enforcing peace and justice. The cause of the green flag of Mohammed among the troops that are now overrunning Syria means only the massacre of Gentiles, but in the power of the Moslems for a 'holy war,' and the sign of a general uprising of Mohammedans, which, unless met immediately by prompt, united, powerful forces of Christianity, will spread until the armies of millions mark the beginning of an era of cruelty and bloodshed so terrible that the world may well shudder at the prospect. It is the duty of Christians to listen longer quietly to the cries of despair that come to us? And either from greed of gold, or cowardice, connive longer with crime? If Islam is allowed to gather itself together for the great death grapple of the ages in its fight against the Christian world, the conquest of the world, beware! 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
