"Y" AT EVERY CROSSING

Are an Essential of Railroad Management if the Courts Sustain the Decision.

No decision of more importance to the farmers of the state has been made for several years than that which the state railroad and warehouse commissioners have reached in the celebrated Hanley Falls case.

The decision is in favor of the petitioners and against the railroad companies, and while the case will no doubt be carried into the courts by the defeated corporations, the case has an additional interest from the fact that it is the first thing of its kind under the new law.

This is believed to be a far more advantageous ruling for the petitioners, as it gives them a chance to hear the case in the courts right at home.

Hanley Falls is at the junction of the Sioux Falls & Willmar branch of the Great Northern and the Minneapolis & St. Louis roads.

The people of the two cities, and the citizens of the town of Hanley Falls, are in favor of the "Y" plan, and the commission visited the place to look over the ground and hear testimony.

The people of Lac qui Parle county are stock raisers, and they claim that they lose \$25 on every car of cattle shipped by reason of the round-about haul and extra freight.

The law on the case is the Jacobson "Y" bill, chapter 31, of the General Laws of 1885, as amended.

All common carriers subject to the provisions of this act shall provide at all points of connection, crossing or intersection, where it is practicable and necessary for the interest of traffic, ample facilities by track connections for transferring any cars in the regular business of their respective lines of road from their lines or tracks to those of any other common carrier.

Woods is a large man, rather tall, and looks somewhat like an Englishman of Jewish descent. He is 5 feet 7 1/2 inches in height and weighs 180 pounds.

The first of Mr. Woods' small facts was that he was not Woods, but somebody else.

"Who is Woods, anyway?" asked the reporter.

"I can't say," replied the prisoner. "But he was a lumberman, wasn't he? I tried to believe so, at any rate, for several weeks. But I am F. L. Seaver myself, and I'm a New Yorker. No; I wasn't born in England, but right there in New York. I'm thirty-eight years old. My wife lives at 253 East Thirty-ninth street. I haven't always lived in New York, though. The fact is, I've been in business a good part of my life where strangers were better associates than old friends.

"Well, I wish this was the first time I have ever been in a small, close room with a desire to be elsewhere. But the same thing happened once every day to me for three months. I was in a room with a bank near the big bridge, and I was obliged to take a ride in the Kings county jail in 1891. I didn't change my boarding place until 1894, although the food was only fair and the attendance was wretched.

My business? O, I suppose I've been a capitalist. I've always been trying to make investments at any rate, and I have generally arranged to let somebody else earn the money that I invested.

"Yes, I don't deny that I met that Minneapolis gentleman once or twice. You see, he had some dealings with me when I was in the lumber business, and I made his acquaintance that way. In Prisco? O, who said I knew him there? I wasn't selling lumber on the coast."
