ACKER POSTS RATIFICATION

Of Capt. McCurdy's New Election Develops Marked Outbursts of Patriotic Eloquence.

Men and women crowded Acker post hall last night at the public campfire given by the post in honor of the election of Capt. J. J. McCurdy as department commander.

On being called upon, Judge Kerr said that it might be that the Venezuelan question was probably about settled, but there was a question of principle involved, and that was as to whether the Monroe doctrine had been settled.

It would be best for all the South American countries if they were under the British government, that the Monroe doctrine did not mean anything, and that it was better to sacrifice most anything in preference to bringing on a war.

The Italians were defeated in Abyssinia, and he thanked God for it, but England is backing Italy in its selfish aggression.

The British government was only prevented from taking sides with the South in the rebellion by the threat of Russia, and no matter what might be said about the Russian armament, the speaker always felt kindly toward it for the stand it took in this conflict.

As to the claim that it was better to bring on a war, he quoted from Ruskin, who had been forced to the conclusion that war was the foundation of progress in art, civilization, manhood and morality.
