Human Heart Beats. A remarkable calculation has been made by Dr. Richardson for the Medical Record, which gives the work of the heart in mileage, the amount of blood thrown through the veins, and winds up by giving the exact number of times a human heart will beat in a lifetime of eighty-four years! A verbatim copy of the most interesting portion of this remarkable calculation is given below.

"Presuming that the blood is thrown out of the heart at each pulsation in the proportion of sixty-nine strokes per minute, and at the assumed force of nine feet, then we must come to the following startling conclusion: That the mileage of the blood through the body must be taken at 207 yards per minute, seven miles per hour, or 175 miles per day, or 63,200 miles per year. At the above rate in a lifetime of eighty-four years, the blood mileage of the body is not less than 5,150,880, and in the same long life the grand total of the heart beats will approximate 2,868,776,000."

PENNY PRESS IN TROUBLE. Paper to Continue as a Co-operative Affair. There was more trouble in the office of the Penny Press yesterday morning. The printers, who are two weeks behind in the receipt of their pay, further under existing conditions, the principal of which was the connection of A. J. Blithen Sr. with the paper. So they went on a strike, and for a time it appeared as though the evening issue would not see the light. On the statement that a meeting of all employes would be held after working hours, the printers returned to work, and the paper came out. Last night the printer discussed the situation, insisted on the immediate withdrawal of Mr. Blithen, and demanded to try and run the paper themselves.

WAS IT FOUL PLAY? Army Officers to Investigate the Sheldon Case. The military authorities at Fort Snelling are not satisfied with the findings of the coroner at Minneapolis in respect to the death of the soldier, Sheldon, who was found dead near the short line junction, in South Minneapolis, yesterday light. They say that the autopsy at Minneapolis, which caused the report of accidental death, was held without any serious effort at other investigation. In fact, before any thorough investigation was possible. They will, therefore, hold an investigation of their own at the fort this morning. Sheldon's resignation was taken there last night. The army surgeon, who is in charge of the examination of the remains, and an investigation as to possible explanations of Sheldon's mysterious death will be made. The only occupant of the room at the time of the victim's foul play, and while they are making no assertions explanatory of their belief, they manifest a marked interest in the promised investigation.

STILLWATER NEWS. Plenty of Logs at Nevess' Dam for Sawing. It is estimated that there are nearly 30,000,000 feet of logs in Nevess' dam, so the boom company will not have to raise the new logs to arrive before work can begin. They are now waiting for the lake to open up so that a log can be taken care of after they are sorted.

The old city council held its last meeting last evening, and the new council will begin the administration of city affairs next morning evening. The council has been Democratic for several years, but will now be Republican. The old council after straightening up its affairs celebrated the closure of its usefulness by burning \$24,000 worth of city bonds, drawing 10 per cent interest, which were taken up last fall. The bonded indebtedness of the city is \$271,000, and of this amount \$6,000 falls due in 1900. The new council, at its next meeting, will elect a street commissioner, levee master, chief of the fire department and bridge toll collector, the city clerk and city attorney, both Democrats, holding over another year.

Ada Marty, George Estabrooks and John Lewis have returned from a trip to the Rainy lake country. G. I. Gorham, assignee of Drews Bros., has filed a statement of assets and liabilities, showing the former to be \$1,507,17, and the latter \$4,960.68.

FALL OF AEROLITES. Meteoric Fragments Scattered All Along the Spanish Coast. According to a telegram from Bordeaux to the Belair, an aerolite has been seen to fall near Sores, in the department of the Landes. The observation was made at about 10 o'clock Monday morning, the hour at which the aerolite recently fell at Madrid. Two people who were in a field noted the phenomenon. The fall of the aerolite was accompanied by a report and a trail of yellow fire, which suddenly changed to red.

The fall was from west to east, in an oblique direction, and the aerolite struck the river Leyre. The explosion seemed to occur about thirty yards from the ground. At the time the aerolite was seen to fall, the sky was clear and the air was calm.

THE ACROPOLIS ILLUMINATED.

All the World and His Wife Abroad to Take Part in the Festivities.

ATHENS, April 7.—Another great crowd was in attendance at the games today, and the interest in the festival continues unabated. The royal family of Greece witnessed the games from the position especially provided for them, as they did yesterday. Tonight the Acropolis is illuminated, and all the world and his wife is abroad to take part in the gaieties of the occasion. The city presented a most animated appearance.

At the games today the American contestants again covered themselves with honor. Thomas B. Curtis, of the Boston team, won the heat in which he contested for the hurdlers. His time was 18 sec. An Englishman, Goulding, won the other heat in 18.2 sec. Ellery H. Clark, of the Boston team, won the broad jump with 6 metres 34 centimetres. Robert Garrett, captain of the Princeton team, was second, with 6 metres. James B. Connolly, of Boston, was third with 5 metres 84 centimetres. Thomas E. Burke, of the Boston team, won the third heat of the 400 metres running race in 1:45 sec. H. B. Jameson, of Princeton, was second. Robert Garrett, of Princeton, won the shot put with 11 metres 22 centimetres. Flack, an Australian, won the first heat of the mile run in 4 min., 33 sec. Arthur Blake, of the Boston team, was second. In the trial heat of the hurdle race W. W. Hoyt, of the Boston team, was defeated by Thomas P. Curtis, of the same team.
