THEIR HOME MARKET.

One of those gentlemen, more or less intimately connected with the Republican press, who have been making their journey to the modern Damascus known as Canton, to pay homage to the Great Apostle of Protection, and play, in a refined and dignified way, the part of the fulsome Jenkins, wrote a comparative description of the conditions of the farmers about the little manufacturing city at the present time and when he knew them as a farmer's boy in the period before the war.

Foraker in his message to the Ohio legislature, at the very time when the Apostle's policy was in full force, that the price of farm lands in Ohio had decreased 50 per cent. It is convenient at times to have a memory that serves one indifferently well.
