FREE MARKET HALL

A CUSTOM WHICH IS COSTING THE CITY MONEY IS CONDEMNED.

WHAT SHOULD BE A REVENUE

IS AN ADDITIONAL BURDEN ON THE TAXPAYERS OF THE CITY OF ST. PAUL.

NOT MUCH IN THE AGGREGATE

But Enough It is Claimed to Warrant a Change in the System.

Those organizations, political, religious and otherwise which have been wont to use the Central Market hall free of charge, may hereafter be compelled to pay rent for the same. This change is in accordance with the sentiments of the members of the common council who propose to reform the old practice of granting the free use of Market hall to every society or individual applying for the privilege.

Inasmuch as the market house property has never been self-sustaining, the policy of letting the Market hall free of charge has been questioned frequently of late. Tuesday night the matter was brought squarely before the board of aldermen in the shape of an application for the free use of the hall in which to conduct a political meeting in the interest of Gen. Moses E. Clapp for governor of the state. The resolution granting the privilege failed to receive the necessary two-thirds vote on the first roll call, as four of the aldermen were opposed to the general policy of giving the free use of the hall for political meetings. But as it has been the custom heretofore to grant a like privilege to all applicants the vote was reconsidered through the efforts of Alderman Bigelow and the application granted.

The resolution as presented authorized the market master to let the Market hall for the purpose desired, but Alderman Bigelow proposed an amendment that the word "free" be inserted after word "let." It was the amendment that failed to secure a two-thirds vote on the first roll call, and which was adopted after Alderman Bigelow's motion to reconsider had prevailed.

In this connection President Markham suggested that it would be advisable for the committee on markets and public buildings to consider at some time in the near future the advisability of adopting certain rules to govern the use of the hall.

The resolution granting the free use of the market hall for the Clapp meeting on the night of June 26, as well as another resolution extending a similar privilege to the St. James M. E. church and still a third, granting the free use of the hall for the Populist convention next Saturday afternoon, all of which the board of aldermen passed, will not become effective until the assembly at its regular meeting to-night occurs in the action of the board. In the case of the application of the two political bodies, it is quite possible that they will be turned down, and required to pay rent if they use the hall, just as they would if they desired to occupy any other hall or theater. While neither of the council committees on markets and public buildings has taken any action as yet, Assemblyman Thompson of the assembly committee on Markets and Public Buildings yesterday informed him that his committee would wait on him soon in order to gain some information concerning the custom of donating the use of the market hall.

Market Master Webster when seen yesterday by a reporter for the Globe to be said that he had not recently assumed the office, having received his commission on June 3. During the two weeks since that time the Common Council had granted the free use of the hall twice, and he had not had time to make how many nights in the year this privilege was extended, as the record was kept by his predecessor, but subsequent to the board of aldermen that the average for a year was at least once a week as during the late fall and winter months certain churches secured the hall for holding fairs some of which lasted for six consecutive nights. According to a conservative estimate Market hall is occupied free of charge from 60 to 75 times a year.

When the hall is let to free of charge the city pays any expenses that may be incurred for lighting and heating. The gas bill for a night meeting lasts from 8 p. m. to 11 p. m. amounts to at least \$3.00 as there are about 150 burners in use. During the cold weather there is also the cost of the extra fuel consumed in heating the big hall. While the total disbursements for one night's use of the hall may not cost the city over \$6 or \$7, the members of the council consider the expenditure of the public moneys for such a purpose entirely unnecessary when the city might just as well receive a rental of \$25 or \$30 for the use of the hall. Said the market master yesterday:

"I am confident that nine tenths, if not all of the individuals and societies who apply for the free use of the hall can and will pay rent if their applications are refused. Take the case of the application for the free use of the hall for the Clapp meeting. The parties having charge of the matter came to me a few days ago and inquired what the rent of the hall would be for one night. I told them it would be \$30. 'Very well' was their reply, 'we will pay for it if we are unable to get the hall for nothing.' And that's about the case with all the applicants."

Another gentleman remarked that it was simply a loose way of doing the business of the city. "The hall would bring in \$2,000 a year" said he, "by charging a reasonable rent for its use, whereas now it costs the city money to keep it going for anybody who happens to need it. There is need of the application of a little private business economy to the public affairs so far as that matter is concerned."
