HIGH COURT RESTS

SUPREME COURT'S APRIL TERM CLOSED WITH THE DOINGS OF YESTERDAY.

THREE MONTHS' BUSINESS.

ABOUT 300 CAUSES IN LITIGATION HAVE COME BEFORE THAT TRIBUNAL.

MANY OPINIONS WERE UPSET.

In Nearly a Third of the Cases Decided, Lower Courts Have Been Reversed.

Yesterday was the last day of the April term of the supreme court, and all the cases which have not been disposed of to date, were continued to the next term.

On yesterday's docket were a number of cases against Anna Munch, in which she was the appellant. She has died since the cases were placed on the calendar, but her administrator, Adolph Munch, was granted permission to appear as appellant in the cases.

The following decisions were handed down yesterday afternoon, Chief Justice Start signing the opinions: Gust Lindahl, appellant, vs. Duluth Street Railway Co., respondent.

The defendant, a street railway company, required by its rules that its employees in charge of its cars should give timely warning, by proper signal to its employees engaged in track repairing, of the approach of its cars. The plaintiff in reliance on such rules and while at work repairing the track was struck and injured by the failure of the motorman to give such signals and by his running the car at a rate of speed prohibited by law. Held, that the plaintiff and the motorman were fellow servants and that the defendant is not liable for the injuries resulting from the negligence of the motorman.

Order affirmed.

James Matthews, respondent, vs. Hershay Lumber Company, appellant.

The correctness of certain tally cards which were the basis of the scale bills received in evidence, was in issue in this case, and for the purpose of impeaching the integrity of the tallyman who made the cards and their correctness the defendant offered to prove subsequent particular acts of misconduct on the part of the tallyman occurring two years after the cards were made, from which it is claimed that an admission that the cards were fraudulent might be implied. Held, that such evidence was inadmissible without first laying the foundation therefor by proof sufficient in the opinion of the trial court to establish the fact that the tallyman was acting for or in collusion with the plaintiff as to such alleged acts.

Certain rulings of the trial court as to the admission and rejection of evidence considered and held to be correct.

Judgment affirmed.

W. Potter et al., respondents, vs. E. G. Holmes et al., appellants.

A contract by the parties hereto for the sale of railroad ties was held to be void, payment therefor was to be made thirty days after the ties had been inspected and accepted. The purchase of the ties, failed to allege either such inspection and acceptance, or facts which would relieve the plaintiff from the necessity of making and proving such allegation, it does not state a case of action. Order reversed.

Mary Morrow, as administratrix, appellant, vs. St. Paul City Railway Company, respondent.

Where the trial court assigns an insufficient amount of damages, and in granting a new trial the order will not be reversed if it appears from the record that judicial errors were committed on the trial which were corrected.

Held, that the trial court erred in submitting to the jury the question whether the defendant furnished the plaintiff's intestate, an employee of the defendant, a safe for the purpose of storing his money and valuables.

Order affirmed.

A. M. Hayes, respondent, vs. Board of County Commissioners of Blue Earth County, appellant.

Section 331, General Statutes 1894, which provides that in the event of a conflict of any survey, board of county commissioners, or town supervisors, construed and held to entitle a party to a benefit and protection of the provisions of section 10 of the original act, he must have settled upon the land claimed on or before March 1, 1877. Judgment modified.

The St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railway Company, respondent, vs. Michael Broquette, respondent.

Chapter 201, S. L. 1877, approved March 1, relating to the time for the completion of the St. Paul & Manitoba Railway company's extension lines, as amended by chapter 71, S. L. 1878, construed and held that to entitle a party to a benefit and protection of the provisions of section 10 of the original act, he must have settled upon the land claimed on or before March 1, 1877. Judgment modified.

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WILL IMPROVE ROBERT STREET.

What the Laying of a New Pavement Means.

The final order for paving Robert street from Third street to Seventh, which passed both boards of the common council, Thursday night, includes peremptory instructions to all corporations and companies to make provision for placing their wires underground.

The property owners on Robert street may reasonably expect permanent and latest improved method of street railway construction, such as the street railway company has adopted on Oakland avenue.

Instead of laying the ordinary light rail on a wooden tie, the company is using the heavy grooved steel rail, resting directly on the concrete foundation, and bound to the opposite rail by iron rods, thus doing away with all wood.

Furthermore this construction provides for the use of overhead trolley wires for the power, and dispenses with the granite trolleying, thus giving a smooth surface from curb to curb.
