INDIANA ART CLUBS

INDIANAPOLIS ART AS DISCUSSED BY MISS SELLICK OF THAT PLACE.

A WOMAN OF RARE CULTURE.

SHE IS DEEPLY INTERESTED IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF THAT STUDY.

AND AN ENTHUSIASTIC WORKER

In Many Indianapolis Clubs and Societies Which Put St. Paul to Shame.

Miss Sellick, the guest of Miss Grace Bee Whitridge, of this city, is the supervisor of art in the Indianapolis high school, a thorough artist, and one of the most cultured women in that highly cultured city. Her conversation with a Globe reporter yesterday was interesting and instructive. Her manner is quiet and composed. She is a woman of strong individuality—and every word she says counts. She spoke at some length of the various clubs and educational advantages of her city, in the development of which she is deeply interested.

"Indianapolis is a city of clubs," she said. "In some of them the work accomplished is very thorough. The Gentlemen's club, to which only broad-minded men, of marked ability in their several professions, can be admitted, is one of the best known in the city. The subjects discussed are literary in character, and some of the papers read are full of power. A similar organization is the Woman's club—please do not say ladies," she requested with a quiet sarcasm—"which corresponds to your Century club. The Portfolio club, of which I am a member, is bohemian in character. Only people who have accomplished something, artists, writers, musicians, are admitted. It is not enough that a person be highly educated. We have little lunches at each meeting, and are strictly informal. Very different, but equally interesting to many is the Contemporary club, organized by Mr. and Mrs. Lencill, the able principals of the girls' classical school of Indianapolis, one of the finest preparatory schools in the country. To this club belong the city's 400. It is unique in that the work is done entirely by outsiders. Once a month some person of renown is hired to read a paper on a subject of interest to the members, who learn in this way."

"Tell about the Sketching club," suggested Miss Whitridge. "I was a member of it when Miss Sellick first organized it, and I don't want to see it neglected."

"The sketching club," continued Miss Sellick, "is composed of 25 young ladies, who are artists or art critics. We meet every two weeks, at the members' homes, but we shall have a room of our own next year. Papers are written and discussions held on the subject of 'The Modern Movement in Art,' a review given at each meeting of magazine articles in art lines, and an exhibit of some form of art. Tiffany sent last year a stained glass window and \$600 or \$800 worth of glass vases.

We expect next year to have an exhibit of paper and different styles of printing. In addition to this, every member must bring a sketch for exhibition at each meeting. The club began as a simple sketching party, but we have progressed since then. We aim to be thorough in all we attempt." Miss Sellick is the art critic and organizer of this club. Three or four of the members will make art a profession and Miss Sellick expects some good work from them in the future. Another club of which Miss Sellick is directress is The Pen and Ink club, which makes a specialty of studying the modern illustrators. Members are of both sexes and a few are illustrators of note. The art association of the city which attends to the loan of pictures for the various art exhibits and the buying of pictures for the gallery, is very efficient. The exhibition given for one month last year, of pictures loaned from the art galleries of New York and Chicago, was a great success. The art schools of the city and the art advantages in the high school are above the average in cities of the size of Indianapolis. It is interesting to learn that a Minneapolis woman will be president of the Northwestern Drawing association next year—a work in which Miss Sellick is interested.

"Are the advantages in music equal to those in art and literature?" asked the reporter who began to think the advantages in the latter considerably above the average.

"We have three conservatories, one of which is directed by Mr. Ahrens, one of the finest directors in the Northwest. He is also the leader of a splendidly trained chorus and the finest church choir in the city. The Ladies Matinee Musical controls largely the music of the city and gives us the finest of twelve years' study. You result of the philosophy of Shakespeare's work. The entire winter was spent in the study of Macbeth. A lecture was given by Miss Kingsley, Charles Kingsley's daughter, accounting for the figures of speech in the play, the result of twelve years' study. You can imagine the interest when you learn that Miss Kingsley's home was close by the haunts where the great master learned and developed his marvelous command of his mother tongue."

Miss Sellick is an enthusiastic member of this club. Some idea of her energy and accomplishment is given by her closing remarks.

"I have only one evening in the week unoccupied by such study." St. Paul claims a few clubs of which she is justly proud, but compared to this record, she has ample room for development.

HURRAH FOR THE CIRCUS.

Another feature of the big show will be Capt. Woodward's school of educated sea lions. Skill, patience and kindness have at length actually taught these queer amphibious creatures to use their flippers with the deftness of artistic hands and feet, in the accomplishment of a number of most wonderful and amusing tricks and imitations. They really drill, dance after a mermaid fashion, play upon musical instruments, sing solos and choruses, pitch and catch with marvelous accuracy, and do many other things in most human fashion. "Leo," the monster and only sea lion marine comic, makes more fun than any whole company of bipedal clowns, and the entire performance is of a character to make even old Neptune applaud and roar with laughter, in his surliest mood.
