

SOL'S DAY TO SHINE

YESTERDAY WAS THE HOTTEST DAY OF THE SEASON SO FAR.

THERMOMETER SAID BUT 95,

ALTHOUGH THE AVERAGE SUPERFICER FELT THAT IT WAS MUCH HIGHER.

LIKELY TO BE COOLER TODAY

Observer Lyons Gives Some Reassuring Predictions for the Coming 24 Hours at Least.

Contrary to the general impression that heat expands and cold contracts, it was noticeable that the intense heat of yesterday had the opposite effect on some things, notably the attendance at churches, ball games, and other down town places...

At 12 o'clock, noon, the thermometer registered 87 degrees in the shade, but those who believed that the highest point had been reached were much mistaken. At 2 p. m. the indicator evidenced the fact that the weather had grown warmer by eight degrees, and reached 95.

The day was the hottest of the year so far, locally.

At 7 p. m. the thermometer registered 90, and the certainty of an Alpine guide on a glassy glacier, absolutely helpless.

As before stated it was the hottest day so far this summer, and exceeded by one degree the top-notch of last year, which was reached July 5, 1894, however, the July weather was still warmer than yesterday, the thermometer registering an even 100 on the 11th.

Observer Lyons, of the weather bureau, gives forth the following information that the worst is past, and that, in his belief, the weather today will be fair and slightly cooler.

It has to be pretty hot when base ball players, and professionals at that, are over come by the heat of the sun, and the pitcher of the local team, succumbed to the heat while running bases at the West Side park yesterday afternoon.
