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Ordinance No. 1881—No. 1880, An Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 1880, entitled "An Ordinance regulating the licensing and muzzling of dogs in the City of St. Paul." Sec. 1.—That Section 3 of Ordinance No. 1880, entitled "An Ordinance regulating the licensing and muzzling of dogs in the City of St. Paul," approved July 1, 1896, be and the same is hereby amended by adding to the section 3 the following paragraph, to wit: The Chief of Police of the City of St. Paul empowered to provide a regulation for the impounding and destruction of all dogs collected by the Chief of Police has no been paid, and all dogs so collected shall be destroyed in such manner as shall be determined by the Chief of Police within five days after the same are collected and destroyed at the expense of the owner of the animal found. Sec. 2.—This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage by the Assembly July 14, 1896. Passed by the Board of Aldermen July 14, 1896. O. H.
