CONFIRMATION OF ASSESSMENT FOR PAVING WITH ASPHALT OAKLAND STREET, FROM RAMSEY STREET TO SUMMIT AVENUE.

Office of the Board of Public Works, City of St. Paul, Minn., July 18, 1896.

The assessment of benefits, costs and expenses arising from paving with asphalt Oakland street, from Ramsey street to Summit avenue (except between the rails of the street-said tracks) and put in granite curbing (when necessary), including the necessary gas, water and sewer connections to the property lines, and all conduits authorized by the Board of Public Works, in the City of St. Paul, Minn., on the 3d day of August, 1896, to cause to be shown to the contrary, said assessment will be confirmed by said Board.
