NEARLY 20,000 CARS IN 1896

WERE PATCHED UP AND SENT OUT INTO THE WORLD AGAIN.

CAR INSPECTION ASSOCIATION

Holds Its Annual Meeting at the Union Depot—Bural Districts Complain of Heat.

The annual meeting of the Minnesota Transfer Joint Car Inspection Association, held at the union depot yesterday, showed an abundance of that important institution in a very favorable light, and opened the eyes of even the members to the amount of business transacted by the concern.

There were represented at the meeting the Chicago Milwaukee & St. Paul, Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha, Northern Pacific, Great Northern, Minneapolis & St. Louis, Wisconsin Central, Chicago Great Western, Chicago Burlington & Northern, and the Minnesota Transfer.

The annual report of Supt. Dudgeon was presented to all, as it shows that during the past year the enormous number of 202,250 cars have been inspected in the yards of the Transfer company at Midway, and that 19,940 cars have been repaired to a greater or less extent.

An arbitration committee was appointed, the members to be selected by the officers of the following roads: Northern Pacific, Great Northern, Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha, Chicago Milwaukee & St. Paul, and the Minnesota Transfer.
