THE DIAMOND KING.

How a daring American impostor fooled the gay Parisians.

Worked the newspapers. With their assistance he was proclaimed the diamond king.

Bogus gems sold the French. A pair of clever rascals who slipped away from the officers of the law.

The diamond mines of Brazil have been but little less famous than those of Golconda, in India, and fortunes were made from them generations before the South African diamond fields at Kimberley were discovered.

A few years before the downfall of Napoleon III the craze for diamonds increased in Paris, the Dus de Morny and other noblemen and capitalists spending fortunes in adding to their stock of this precious stone. About this time there appeared in a number of French and English papers the announcement that Colonel Pedro Gonzales, known in Brazil as the Diamond King, was about to visit Europe and that he would bring with him a collection of gems such as could not be equaled in Europe.

This was an ordinary news article, but, as we shall see, it and the others of like tenor that followed were parts of a carefully planned scheme of plunder which for audacity has not been equaled in the whole history of brilliant imposture.

While the ordinary reader in London and Paris had forgotten all about these reports, the memory was still in the minds of diamond collectors, when the newspapers announced that Colonel Pedro Gonzales, the Diamond King, had reached London and would at once proceed to Paris.

The news item in the London telegraph was as follows:
Colonel Pedro Gonzales, recently created count by his majesty Dom Pedro, emperor of Brazil, has for years been reported to the world as the Diamond King. He is a man of great wealth and stands near to the throne in his native land.

Col. Gonzales travels in simple style, his only attendant, being a valet, who, curiously enough, is an American Yankee, to whom Portuguese and French come as easily as English.

The colonel proposes to remain in Europe for some years, as he wishes his two boys and two girls to have the advantage of the best continental schools. As soon as he has decided on a place of residence the countess and children will join him.

A representative of the Telegraph had the pleasure and honor of meeting the diamond king yesterday at the Langham hotel. He talks English without an accent, and might easily pass for a London merchant in easy circumstances. He is of medium height, well built and erect. Only the dark eyes and black hair and beard suggest his south European ancestry.

At our request Col. Gonzales kindly showed us some of his gems, which, by the way, he had not brought over for sale. Without much knowledge of the actual value of these diamonds, the Telegraph representative was dazzled by their beauty and found himself breaking the commandment against covet
