

SPAIN'S NEW WORRY

OUTBREAK IN THE PHILIPPINES REGARDED AS A SERIOUS DEVELOPMENT.

TROUBLES ADDED AT HOME.

REPUBLICANS INVOLVED IN A PLOT TO PREVENT CUBAN REINFORCEMENT.

RELEASE OF POLITICAL PRISONERS

Great Secrecy Observed as to the Movements of Men Set Free by England.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—The developments of the troubles of Spain are followed here with considerable interest.

The outbreak in the Philippine islands is regarded as seriously increasing her difficulties, and the news of the discovery of the conspiracy has caused great excitement in Madrid, where it is stated that the government is considering the advisability of promptly reinforcing the Spanish garrisons.

The embarkation of reinforcements for Cuba comes today. The Spanish police are extremely active in the towns throughout the country just now in endeavoring to get at the bottom of the supposed Republican plot to cause an uprising by exciting the masses who oppose the departure of further troops for Cuba.

In the meanwhile, the liberals are continuing their policy of obstruction in the chamber in trying to prevent the passage of the extraordinary budget, which involves a renewal of the tobacco monopoly and the concessions of the Almaden quicksilver mines to the Rothschilds, in addition to railway subsidies, all of which the liberals oppose as against public interests.

Patrick J. O'Brien, M. P., had a long interview with the secretary of the United States embassy, James Roosevelt, today, and it is believed that it had some connection with the steps to be taken to transport the released Irish political prisoners to America.

MILITARY CABAL IS CONDEMNED.

Held by German Press to Blame for Von Schellendorf's Fall, and Present Crisis.

BERLIN, Aug. 22.—The German press has rarely been so unanimous as at present in condemning the camarilla which caused the downfall of Gen. Bronsart von Schellendorf, former minister for war, and the present crisis.

The civil cabinet of the emperor is also saddled with a share of the blame for similar reasons, and even the strictly legal Conservative newspapers, like the Reichsbote, as well as the papers inspired by the imperial chancellor, like the Hamburger Correspondent, speak derisively of the auxiliary government which runs the emperor's private cabinet and points out that this means a grave infringement of the constitution which is bound to end in trouble.

The true story of the retirement of Gen. von Schellendorf leaked out this week. The emperor and his cabinet, it appears, held a conference in the rejuvenation of the army as well as the civil administration, and it is due to this that not only the elderly, experienced generals and officers of the general staff have been gradually replaced by new and untried men, but the courts and all the civil offices are similarly suffering.

It is interesting to note that the emperor, addressing the First Guard regiment at Potsdam, during the week, said: "Never forget that you have sworn obedience and fidelity unto death to me, your war lord. Let no other considerations ever interfere with this, your highest duty."

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CHANGES ARE FEW

OFFICIAL CIRCULARS OF APPOINTMENTS OF THE GREAT NORTHERN RAILWAY.

A BATCH OF THEM ISSUED

CONFIRMING THE UNOFFICIAL, BUT AUTHORITY STATEMENTS PUBLISHED IN THE GLOBE.

RECEIVERS HEARD FROM ALSO.

They Will Deliver Possession of the Road on Midnight, Aug. 31 to the New Company.

Circulars officially announcing the reorganization of the Northern Pacific Railway company, which was issued yesterday.

The undersigned receivers of the Northern Pacific Railway company will, at midnight of August 31, 1896, deliver to the Northern Pacific Railway company possession of all the property and franchises of the Northern Pacific Railway company.

All business of the receivers of the Northern Pacific Railway company up to and including the month of August, 1896, and all reports covering same, should be accounted for and sent, and all moneys pertaining to same should be remitted to the Northern Pacific Railway company.

As the undersigned will cease to operate as receivers of the Northern Pacific Railway company on the 31st of August, 1896, and all reports covering same, should be accounted for and sent, and all moneys pertaining to same should be remitted to the Northern Pacific Railway company.

Subsequent circulars will be issued within a day or two covering General Traffic Manager Hannaford's department. This will be in the nature of a confirmatory circular as Mr. Hannaford stated before his departure.

It is understood, however, that the traffic department, Charles S. Fee will remain at the head of the passenger department, while A. L. Craig and B. N. Austin, general ticket agent and assistant general passenger agent, respectively. S. L. Moore will continue in the position of general freight agent.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—The Clover Leaf made some trouble for the Western lines today by announcing a rate of \$12 from interior points to Mackinac and return. The Washab once announced it would make this rate good via Chicago. Efforts were made to have the Washab keep the cut out of the Chicago market, but was found impossible for it to do so.

WESTERN ROADS QUIT.

Ferry Company Can Cut All Its Expenses.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—The traffic officials of the lines between Chicago and St. Paul held a meeting today to consider the advisability of meeting the reduction made by the Lake Michigan Car Ferry company.

The great weight of opinion in the meeting was in favor of letting the ferry company cut rates as it liked. The reduction of 40 cents on first-class freight is more than the lines can stand, and as the lake lines can handle only a limited amount of freight at best, it was proposed that they be allowed to go ahead and cut the rates as they liked.
