TO BUFFALO IN '97 NOT IN SUCH HUMOR

SUGGESTION THAT PLANS FOR A TRIP TO THE NEXT ENCAMPMENT

HAS TREADY TAKEN FOOT. THEY RESENTED A POSITION

TALK OF FORMING A CLUB AT ONCE TO PREPARE FOR NEXT YEAR.

MEETING TO BE HELD SHORTLY.

Interesting News about the Events of the Closing Days of the G. A. R. Here.

The Buffalo people who went home happy yesterday with the selection of their home town as the next place for the encampment of the G. A. R. in their pocket, probably made more friends in St. Paul than any other commandery present. In fact, their friends are counted by the thousands, and Buffalo can prepare itself in 1897 for a crowd from St. Paul that will eclipse that from any other city and will be only excelled by Buffalo alone. In fact, so strong a sentiment has been created that many influential people of St. Paul, including, especially, newspaper people, business men, and the prophets of the leading hotels, informally talked the matter over yesterday of forming a Buffalo club in St. Paul with the object of marching en masse to capture Fort Porter in 1897, and show Buffalo that a Western town can appreciate the hand of good fellowship when extended by such good boys as those who visited the present encampment.

After talking the matter over it was decided to call a meeting for some day next week of all those interested, and invite all their friends and form a permanent organization, elect officers and appoint committees to outline a plan to the end that all who desire may become members and participate in the proposed excursion. At the discussion yesterday it was the opinion of those assembled that the best way to organize is formed an initiation and due system should be inaugurated which would be available toward paying the expenses of the trip next year, and should also be used in uniforming those who would take part in the excursion. All the Buffalo boys expressed a sincere desire to be able to greet their St. Paul friends at home in 1897, and when the above plan was outlined to them were profuse in their expressions and hopes of the success of such a movement, and stated that the freedom of the entire city would be at the disposal of the citizens of St. Paul, and any one who should accompany them at the next encampment.

A plan like that outlined above, it is thought, would meet with general favor, and could be made to include not only the citizens, but the veterans of St. Paul as well, and going in such a large body would be a grand advertising card for the city. While some may think it is too early to put forward such a movement, others think that its success depends mainly on its early inauguration in order to get all classes thoroughly aroused and interested in perfecting ways and means, and, by a systematic canvass, obtain a large body that by the simple force of numbers it will be within the range of financial possibility for all to attend who may desire. When the formal announcement of the meeting is made it is expected that all who meet Buffalo while here will attend, as well as those who were not so fortunate.

IN A HAPPY HUMOR

WAS THE LOYAL LEGION'S RATIFICATION OF COMPANION CLARKSON'S NEW HONOR.

GEN. BROOKE'S SHARP shafts

ARE GRACEFULLY PARRIED BY THE GUESTS OF THE JOYOUS OCCASION.

MAJ. CLARKSON AND OTHERS

Tell How It All Happened, and How Glad They Are to Have It Happen.

There was a very warm-hearted and thoroughly informal justification at the headquarters of the Loyal Legion in the Ryan annex last evening, at which Commander-in-Chief Clarkson was the central figure and the lion of the hour.

The reception was tendered the new commander in honor of his election yesterday morning. The very unconventional tone of the affair was its chief attraction, and Commander Clarkson appeared highly elated at the genuineness of the welcome he received.

Gen. John R. Brooke, U. S. A., officiated in the capacity of toastmaster, and no one will accuse him of lacking wit. He made several sharp sallies in introducing the speakers of the evening. Nearly all of the eminent men of the encampment were present, those who were not having either been delayed or left the city.

At the head of the line of tables, which were scattered with delightful irregularity about the big room, sat ex-Commander-in-Chief Walker, with Gen. Brooke on his right, and Past Commander-in-Chief John P. Rea on his left, with other men prominent in the council of the G. A. R. and Loyal Legion scattered about. In introducing the new commander, Gen. Brooke paid him a tribute. The assembled companions greeted the commander by rising to their feet.

Commander-in-Chief Clarkson said: "There is nothing which so deeply touches my heart as the greeting and welcome of a soldier. No one can explain its wealth of sentiment, or account for its genuineness, who has not felt its awakening fires. There is something in this bronze badge we wear, and in this button of red, white and blue which unites us in a common bond. It signifies that we passed through the valley of the shadow of death side by side; that we entered the jaws of hell with our elbows touching; that we suffered trials and tribulations without complaint, risking our all to keep Old Glory flying. It is because we risked our lives in a common cause, there is something beautiful in this comradeship. I find much exultation in being elected the commander-in-chief of this great body of 400,000 men, who, in the dark days of the past, strove to maintain the unity of the states, and place America upon the highest pinnacle. But I cannot tell you the feeling of responsibility, and the weight of the burden which has fallen upon my shoulders. You, my companions and comrades, are going down, down the hill of life. Many of you are striving to secure the meager pittance which is your just due, and one of our greatest objects is to assist you. I feel confident that, shoulder to shoulder, we shall pass through the coming year to still greater results. You will, I know, assist me in bearing the responsibility. I thank you from the bottom of my heart for the honor you have conferred upon me."

Commander Clarkson spoke with evident feeling, and several times his voice grew husky from emotion. The Modoc quartette took away the mournfulness by starting a rollicking song, "We Believe You, Just Now."

Ex-Department Commander Cummings, of Pennsylvania, told the story of the election of Commander Clarkson; said it was largely the result of the favor of the Quaker state. "While Pennsylvania recognized the great services of Admiral Meade, and the debt the country owes to the navy, we decided after considering all the candidates for nearly three hours in caucus, that Commander Clarkson would best subserve the interests of the grand army, and we decided to vote for him as a unit. His year's work will inure greatly to the benefit of the order, and we pledge him the loyal support of every veteran in the department of Pennsylvania."

At this point, Gen. Brooke picked up a bottle of rye from the table, and eyeing it silently for a moment, said: "This is the water upon which none of our companions present tonight was brought. It is the water of the Monongahela, which has done so much to enlighten the world. It is Monongahela rye. I take pleasure, gentlemen, in introducing to you Past Department Commander Hazzard, who was reared near the place where this water flows."

Commander Hazzard came right back at the general with a story which went to prove that the latter knew something about the wonderful waters himself. "I remember once when Gen. Brooke was in Pittsburgh stopped at the hotel. He went into the buffet, and, in that great, dignified way of his, asked

for a cocktail. When the mixture was ready he quaffed it for a moment, and, turning to the mixer, said: 'Young man, you have got too much Allegheny and too little Monongahela in this.' In a less facetious strain, Commander Hazzard expressed his delight, and the delight of the veterans present, at the manner in which the city of St. Paul had entertained the encampment, saying that, although the East was accustomed to the impulsive hospitality of the West, it was wholly unprepared for the lavishness of the reception, the beauty of the decorations, etc. 'Adj. Gen. George Burmaster,' appointed to that office yesterday, was called upon, and responded with a war whoop and closed by making a few remarks upon the reception St. Paul had accorded the G. A. R.

Addresses were also made by Capt. Appleton and others. Music was also rendered by the Mendelssohn quartette.
