Market Largely Perfunctory, But Closed at Advances.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Today's stock market a perfunctory affair, dealings being on an abnormally light scale, and the fluctuations, generally speaking, fractional. Traders were responsible for the limited operations and during the greater part of the session worked upon the bull side in anticipation of a decidedly favorable bank statement, owing to the continued heavy gold imports. The exhibit, while not as disappointing as upon the two previous occasions, failed to come up to expectations, although the shipments of currency by the banks to the interior were lighter than had been prefigured. The statement showed a gain in legal reserve of only \$1,686. 560 and of \$1,478,500 in specie. Deposit increase only \$221,800. A prominent banker estimates that of the \$27,836,550 in gold which has arrived to date, about \$17,000,000 has been absorbed by the treasury department and the banks have probably gained about \$4,000,000. In addition \$2,689,000 was deposited at the subtreasury for examination today. The balance is said to be accounted for other deposits at the subtreasury and assay office for examination. In the early dealings covering advanced Western Union and Manhattan over a point and Leather preferred and Chicago Gas were strong features. After the publication of the bank statement recessions occurred all around. The market closed firm at slight gains generally.
