#### MINNEAPOLIS GLOBULES.

This afternoon at 2:30 the first of the popular priced matinees of "Charley's Aunt" will be given.

Cosgrove, of Michigan.

**WHEEL IN POLITICS.**  
It may Form a Unique Feature in Future Parades.

A preliminary meeting of leading Republicans interested in a proposition to organize a Republican bicycle regiment in Minneapolis was held last evening in the Boston block. The movement has been in the air for some time and was given an additional impetus by the arrival in this city of W. H. Chamberlain, of Chicago, secretary of the National Wheelmen's McKinley and Hobart club. The meeting last evening was held pursuant

to a call issued by F. H. Forbes, the mayor's secretary, and about a dozen men were present. The movement was strongly supported by all present and the following provisional officers were elected: F. H. Forbes, president; Dr. E. B. Zier, vice president; T. Bintliff, secretary. The following were appointed the executive committee, who will act with the officers in the initial work of the club: S. E. Lovejoy, Al J. Smith, H. A. Weid, Colie Bell, Danforth Dickinson. The executive committee will appoint a wheelman in every ward with authority to appoint at least one wheelman from every voting district, all of whom are to meet at the rooms in the Boston block next Tuesday evening. It is expected that at least 2,500 Republican wheelmen in Minneapolis will join the movement and possibly get up an all wheel parade some evening before election.

**No Funds for His Burial.**  
It has not been decided as yet what will be done with the remains of Thomas T. Cordis, the Washington bank messenger, who committed suicide Sunday. His will seems to be in some way of a quandary, owing to a lack of means, as to what to do with the remains. A telegram was received from his brother, Sam Cordis, who is connected with the White steamship line in New York, to bury him here. Still, no such preparations have been made, and Anderson, the undertaker, who has the body in charge, stated last evening that he believed that the body would finally be shipped for interment.

He is booked for an address before the county and congressional district convention, which takes place at Harmonia hall, Minneapolis, at 1 o'clock this afternoon. He will speak at the same place this evening. Hon. James P. Phelan, of Des Moines, will preside and make a brief address. Prominent prohibitionists of the two cities will occupy the platform in Minneapolis. He will be the guest of W. J. Dean. Mr. Levering's only other Minnesota date is at Owatonna on Wednesday evening.

**ST. LOUIS, Sept. 21.**—One thousand delegates took part in the opening of the sixth day's session of the national Baptist convention this morning, conducted by Rev. George W. Bolling, of Kentucky, and Charles Stewart, of Chicago. President E. C. Morris, of

**Arkansas, presided.** The report of the committee on the state of the country, which was unanimously adopted, indorsed William McKinley for president of the United States. Resolutions were adopted denouncing the separate coach law in the Southern states, and instructing the secretary to notify the railroads that unless they join in getting the law repealed the denomination would discontinue holding annual meetings in Southern states, and have the business transacted by executive boards, and would also discontinue excursions among the people. Boston was selected for the convention in September, 1897.
