COPELAND IN THE DARK.

Comptroller McCardey Seems to Be No Respector of Persons.

Pulling teeth is an easy task compared to that of extracting information from City Comptroller McCardey, who, in the course of his duties, has been ordered by the department of public works, that there was only a little over \$4,000 left in the street, sewer and bridge maintenance fund, and if so, whether this amount is included in the calculation showing the balance on hand to be something over \$4,000.

Mayor Doran, when questioned yesterday concerning the matter, said: "The amount placed in my hands for the purpose of the street, sewer and bridge fund, which included, of course, the expense of hiring the special policemen and detectives was \$4,000. Of this sum only about \$2,900 was expended. The balance will be returned to the fund from which it was set aside. It is my understanding that it came out of the street, sewer and bridge maintenance fund, which, however, I have been told, was previously reinforced from some other source."

According to the city treasurer's books, the total amount expended for the street, sewer and bridge maintenance fund up to Sept. 1 has been a trifle over \$115,600.

CLOSING THE RESORTS.

Seven of them, the Mayor Says One, Ordered Shut.

It was rumored yesterday that the mayor had instructed the chief of police to notify the trustees of the resorts in the business districts to vacate such houses on or before the 15th inst. A Globe reporter called on Mayor Doran to see if he had been seriously agitated about the matter. He said he had presented the matter to the general city council, and I had not got up to the capitol yet. There's plenty of time. That shows about the weight of the arguments that hold its first session in St. Paul; and at said first session the governor and legislative assembly shall locate and establish a temporary seat of the government at said territory, at such place they may deem eligible; and shall at such time as they see proper prescribe by law the manner of holding the permanent seat of government of said territory by a vote of the people."

In the same section \$20,000 is appropriated for the erection of suitable territorial buildings.

Article 15, of the constitution of the state, says: "Section 1. The seat of government of the state shall be at the city of St. Paul, but the legislature at their first, or any future session, may provide by law for a change of the seat of the government by a vote of the people, or may locate the same upon the land granted by Congress for a seat of government to the state."

The legislative act first above referred to was passed March 1894. In January 1895 the capitol was permanently located at St. Paul, the university at St. Anthony and the state prison at Stillwater. In 1897 the legislature passed a bill for the removal of the capitol to St. Peter, but it turned up missing before reaching the governor, and it

NOTHING IS SAFE

KANDIYOHI WOULD TAKE THE STATE CAPITAL, IN SPITE OF ITS WEIGHT.

SUIT BEGUN AT CROOKSTON FOR AN INJUNCTION TO RESTRAIN THE COMMISSION FROM FURTHER WORK.

PAPERS HAVE BEEN SERVED AND THE COMMISSION WILL MEET TODAY TO DECIDE UPON A COURSE OF ACTION.

Kandiyohi county will have the permanent capital of Minnesota, if "J. F. Fletcher et al." fourteen residents of that county, had their way about it. They have decided that the capital has never been permanently located at St. Paul, just as the three tailors of Tooley street once decided that they were the people. They have found intricacies in the law which they claim make it necessary for the permanent capital of this state to be located in Kandiyohi county. They insist that it be located there.

Six months ago, or thereabouts, there appeared in the Willmar papers a certain "ad" inviting all who would subscribe to a fund for the prosecution of Kandiyohi county's just claims to recognition. It was a great deal like hunting ducks with a brass band, but the people of St. Paul didn't seem to scare a little bit, and the capitol commission went right on laying stone upon stone, as though the capitol to cap the top of Mt. Airora were to be permanent instead of a transitory thing of a hundred years or so.

It now develops that eventually the Kandiyohi people subscribed enough to engage legal services, and J. F. Kelly, a St. Paul man, was engaged, probably in accord with the theory that it is best to fight an enemy with his own weapons.

Matters finally culminated in the service of papers Saturday on Chairman Seabury, and yesterday on H. W. Lambertson, at Winona. Mr. Lambertson was the first one to consider the matter of sufficient moment to even mention it to his friendly general office. The way it leaked out in St. Paul, where the Willmar papers are not of general circulation.

When the commission meets today, as it regularly does on the first Tuesday of the month, it will no doubt direct Mr. Seabury to place the case in the hands of the attorney general.

Chairman Seabury, when seen last night, stated that he had been served with the papers in the suit Saturday afternoon, but that he had not considered the matter until this morning. He even went to warrant any haste in placing the matter before Attorney General Childs, to whom it will be delivered for his preparation of an answer. The commission happened to have a regular scheduled meeting this afternoon, and no doubt all the members when they gathered there will have been served with similar papers.

Mr. Seabury referred to the suit as a bit of buncombe, of which nothing could come, and which nothing deserved to come. The members of the commission had known since spring of the preparations for the suit, so it was not surprising that they probably not be seriously disturbed by it at this time.

"It was not an injunction," said Mr. Seabury, "but an application for an injunction. The courts would not issue any injunction on such a flimsy pretext, although the letter would probably deny these people a hearing."

"The less said about it the better, I thought," he said. "These people have come up with a lot of laws passed by congress settling aside territory for the state of Minnesota, and setting aside a tract about in the geographic center of the state for the purpose of a capitol building. They insist that this tract must necessarily be used for capitol purposes under their act, and that they must have their tract. But as a matter of fact, when the constitution of this state was adopted, the people of the state voted to locate the seat of government in the capitol and desired in favor of St. Paul by a vote of 30,000 to 50,000, or thereabouts. I forget the exact figures, but that was the vote. That choice has not only been approved by the legislature of the state, but by congress and the president of the United States, and I had to believe the selection will stand in spite of the present suit. If I had been seriously agitated about the matter, I would have presented the matter to the general city council, and I did not get up to the capitol yet. There's plenty of time. The thing has been waiting several months now, and I guess it can wait a few hours more."

SO T. E. WALKER REFERS TO THE DOGMA OF FREE SILVER.
