ANOTHER PARTY OF LABORERS COMING IN FROM THE WEST TODAY.

RIVALRY OF CHICAGO LINES.

EACH ONE WOULD LIKE TO CARRY THE MEN TO THE EAST.

FIXING UP THE FREIGHT RATES.

Work That is Being Done on New Transcontinental Tariffs is Temporarily Suspended.

Another large party of Italian laborers will arrive from the North and West this morning, and the Chicago lines will renew their rivalry to secure the plum.

Getting so low that roads are compelled to cut rates on laborers, matters are getting down to a discouraging point.

No one knows yet which of the six Chicago lines will get the load, but it is likely that the Wisconsin Central will make the rate low enough to catch the laborers.

This will be two batches of laborers for the Wisconsin Central, one of the Milwaukee and one for the Burlington, each batch having been carried, it is charged, at a rate far less than the tariffs authorized by the Western Passenger association.

The laborers know a thing or two themselves. They are onto the tricks of the railroads, and each gang has a leader who is deputized to make the arrangements.

The arrangement is generally made, it is believed, by the laborer, who makes a good thing of it between the railroads and the passengers.

The recent order of the Western Passenger association, resulting from the report of a special committee, was calculated to put a stop to just this sort of thing, but the order does not seem to be obeyed.

There is plenty of business in sight for the roads if they continue the cut-rate plan on laborers, for there is a small army still in the Northwest waiting to come down. They break away in detachments and go South for the winter.

None of the roads have as yet lodged a formal complaint against any other line.

WESTERN LINES

Seen to Be Getting Together at Their Meeting.

Very little news is being received by the St. Paul lines concerning the results of the Chicago conference being held by the members of the Western Freight association.

REACTED ON STOCKS

GENERAL SHARE LIST, AFTER OPENING HIGHER, WENT BACK WITH WHEAT.

THE INDUSTRIALS SUFFERED. GRANGERS ALSO YIELDED AN AVERAGE POINT FROM THE DAY'S BEST.

PRICE MOVEMENT WAS ERRATIC.

Slight Net Changes Were Shown at the Close Which Was Steady, But Dull.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The stock market today displayed irregularity on a fairly large aggregate of dealings. The business, as was the case yesterday, was well distributed, with the railroads commanding their full share of interest.

The course of the wheat market exerted important influence on the share speculation, and the reactionary tendency in the first mentioned, together with firmness in the exchange market and a belief that the Bank of England rate would be advanced tomorrow, caused recessions as early as ten o'clock.

The latter conclusion was based upon an advance today in the open discount rate in London to 3 1/2 per cent, and the tradition of the bank to hold the rate in the open market higher than the "street" rate.

The present figure is 3 per cent, and it is variously forecasted that an advance will be made to 3 1/2 or 4 per cent. The obvious inference of a rise in the rate of discount will be seriously impeded the rate of gold to this country.

The initial prices were mainly a fraction above yesterday's closing figures and under heavy buying for both accounts, prices advanced all round. Higher London prices for American securities and reports of a car famine, as a result of the extraordinary movement of wheat and other staples stimulated the rise.

Business notes, most severe in the high priced industrials, Sugar up to 10 1/2 per cent, Chicago Gas, 1 1/2, and Tobacco, 1 1/2 per cent. The latter movement was adversely influenced by liquidation of the Paris market.

WORLD'S AVAILABLE

Increase of Six Million Bushels Shown for Wheat.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Special cable and telegraphic dispatches from Bradstreet's, covering principal points of accumulation, indicate the following changes in available supplies last Saturday, as compared with the preceding Saturday: Available wheat, United States and Canada, east Rockies, increased 2,740,000 bushels; United States and Canada, east Rockies, increased 792,000.

The more important increase in available stocks of wheat last week, not covered in the local vigor supply statement, includes 774,000 bushels in Northwestern Canada points of accumulation; 305,000 in Northwestern Interior elevators; 215,000 in Milwaukee private elevators (due to changing public houses to private) and 148,000 in Chicago private elevators. There was a decrease of 2,800,000 bushels at Galveston and 35,000 at Cleveland.
