

UNCLE SAM'S MAIL

THE COST OF ITS TRANSPORTATION SHOWN BY AN ANNUAL REPORT.

IT RUNS INTO MILLIONS.

ESTIMATES FOR THE COMING YEAR ALSO CONTAIN SOME LARGE FIGURES.

A REORGANIZATION IS URGED.

It Contemplates a Supervision Over Star Routes and a More Equitable Basis of Salaries.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The annual report of Second Assistant Postmaster General Charles Neil shows the annual rate of transportation of mails at the end of the fiscal year to be \$48,523,932, of which \$47,993,067 was for inland mail and the remainder for the foreign service.

For inland mail the cost is an increase of \$1,656,829 for the year. The annual travel in star service alone was over 122,000,000 miles.

The report says the experiments with pneumatic tube service, only one tube, at Philadelphia, now being in active service in the entire postal service.

The report says it is necessary to make closer connections both ways in greatly reduced time, for practically the same money.

For establishing this service \$50,000 is asked for, and three tubes, one each in Philadelphia, New York and Boston are expected to be constructed.

The second assistant says at the large depots, small sub-postoffices should be established in charge of regular superintendents, with full postal office privileges.

The hope of the railway mail service is stated to be to diminish the local work in postoffices to a minimum.

In test case examinations at many points, 98 per cent of letters handled were correctly distributed.

During the year 436 accidents occurred at railway postoffices, five clerks were killed and 112 injured.

The most marked advance of the year in the transportation service was the establishment of steel railway post car lines, of which there are now twenty-six in operation.

An increase of 16 lines, and these handled 650,451 pieces of mail daily. The facilities are made by the roads, conditioned on commensurate compensation by appropriation.

The net cost of the foreign mail service was \$1,520,584, of which \$940,955 was for trans-Atlantic and \$579,629 for trans-Pacific service.

The estimates for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1898, included \$5,525,000 for star service; \$3,900,000 for pneumatic tube service; \$710,000 for regulation and screen wagon service; \$39,200,000 for railway transportation; \$50,000 for pneumatic tube service; \$325,000 for electric and cable car service; \$3,800,000 for railway postoffice cars; \$3,812,000 for railway transportation; \$275,500 for mail equipment; \$1,858,000 for foreign mail service; \$400,000 for a steamboat for use in the transfer of foreign mail in New York harbor.

UNCLE SAM'S DEBT.

October Statement Issued by the Treasury Department.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The October statement of the public debt shows the debt less cash in the treasury on Oct. 31 to have been \$87,495,958, an increase of \$1,000,000 for the month.

The debt is recapitulated as follows: Interest-bearing debt, \$44,354,460; debt on which interest has ceased, \$1,907,010; debt bearing no interest, \$41,134,488.

The cash in the treasury, classified as follows: Gold, \$155,323,826; silver, \$509,068,741; paper, \$154,654,336; bonds, \$1,000,000,000.

TRADE OF CANADA.

Official Figures of a Year's Exports and Imports.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 2.—Official figures of exports and imports for the year, ended June 30, issued by the government, show the total foreign trade of Canada to have been \$249,024,852, compared with \$224,420,485 in 1896.

The total imports were \$118,011,000, against \$110,781,000 in 1896, and exports \$131,013,852, against \$113,639,485 in 1896.

The exports to Great Britain were over \$66,000,000, an increase of \$5,000,000, while to the United States the receipts decreased from \$41,000,000 to \$39,000,000 in round figures.

There is a slight increase in Australian trade, and also with Newfoundland, but the exports in the West Indies dropped from \$2,000,000 to \$2,000,000.

NATIONAL BALANCE SHEET.

Deficit of Over Seven Million Shown for October.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The monthly comparative statement of the receipts and expenditures of the United States shows the total receipts for the month of October to have been \$28,282,823, as compared with \$27,901,736 for the corresponding month of 1897.

The receipts for the month of October are classified as follows: Customs, \$11,105,492; internal revenue, \$13,303,156; miscellaneous, \$1,574,180.

If there is no rain in Bengal, the distress may be serious in parts of Patna and Bhagalpur. The fears, however, are perhaps exaggerated. Relief work has been going on since the beginning of the year.
