HANGS BY A HAIR

CHANCES NOW ARE KENTUCKY WILL GO REPUBLICAN BY A SMALL MAJORITY.

DEMOCRATS CRYING FRAUD.

THIS THEIR ONLY ADMISSION THAT THE STATE IS AGAINST THEM.

REPUBLICAN MARGIN IS NARROW.

On the Latest Returns They Only Claim a Few Over Six Hundred Votes Clear.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 6.—The Times-Star has received the returns from Leslie county, Kentucky, which gives a Republican plurality of 841, and with complete returns from all counties of Kentucky, announces that McKinley has a plurality of 676.

Cincinnati, Nov. 6.—A special to the Commercial-Tribune from Lexington, Ky., says: "Chairman Roberts, at 10 o'clock tonight says official returns from the remaining 19 counties, give McKinley 475 plurality. At an earlier hour, Chairman Johnson, of the Democratic committee, had not ready yet to congratulate Roberts. He believed errors had been made against Bryan in returns where sufficient votes had been given to turn the scale in his favor on the official count."

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 6.—The following statement was handed to the Associated Press tonight by Urey Woodson, a member of the Democratic national committee for Kentucky:

I am more confident tonight than I have been at any time since the election that the Democratic electoral ticket was elected in Kentucky, but I have an abundance of evidence that the Republicans in the mountain counties, where Democrats are exceedingly scarce, have perpetrated the grossest frauds, both before and since the polls closed. This information has come to me from most reputable men at Middlesboro, and other towns in Eastern Kentucky.

The Republican committee and the press of Louisville have kept up a steady claim the past three days of a plurality of from 600 to 1,000. During this time they have been forced to acknowledge to errors which reduced their claims 500 in Fayette county, 628 in Hardin, 484 in Calloway, 331 in Kenton, 100 in Campbell, 100 in Scott and enough in Christian, Henderson, DeWitt, McLean and other counties to still further reduce their claims more than 500.

Thus they have been compelled to scale their calculations nearly 3,000 votes, while the Democratic estimates on these counties have been practically unchanged, but every time they have been forced to acknowledge the truth about one of these central and west counties, which with good geographic and telephone facilities were speedily covered by the news agencies.

They have been forced to draw on one of those remote mountain counties for a majority far surpassing anything ever known in their history, and still they claim the state by 600. The Republicans at the outset claimed 11,600 in the Eleventh (mountain) district, and have gradually risen to 14,300. I am entirely confident of the election of the Bryan electoral ticket by a small but safe majority which will be shown on the final count. Our people are collecting the evidence of these frauds. —Urey Woodson. Member of Democratic National Committee for Kentucky.
