Intruded egg is so like its fellow as to be hardly distinguishable except in its slightly larger size.

It is doubtful whether the sparrow in particular, owing to its similarity, ever realizes the deception.

Indeed, the event is possibly considered the cause of self-congratulation rather than otherwise—at least until her eyes are opened by the fatal denouement of a few weeks later.

And thus the American cow bird outcouples the cuckoo as an "attendant on the spring," taking her pick among the hundreds of feathered birds who are touting the croak by a brief sojourn in the swinging hammock in the elm, her stopping a moment to leave her charge to the care of the indigo bird.

On the secret nest of the Maryland yellow throat, or Wilson's thrush, or chickadee, and unaccountably now appear, here we find the same deadly token safely lodged in the dainty cobweb nest of the vireo, a fragile pendant hung in the bough of a slender branch in which itself would barely appear sufficiently strong to suspend the weight of a cowbird without emptying the nest.

MANY LUMINOUS PLANTS. Several varieties of the vegetable kingdom are luminous in a greater or less degree.

One of the fungi, which is not at all uncommon on the walls of damp, dark mines, caverns, etc., occasionally emits sufficient light to admit of the reading of ordinary print by it.

The emission of light from a common potato when in a state of decomposition is sometimes very striking.

Several of the plants are also luminous, and it is said that in 1849 the mountains near Syree were nightly illuminated by their means.

The root of the plant from the Orachung jungle, supposed to be an orchid, possesses the peculiar property of becoming luminous when wetted, while when dry it is as dark as night.

The double poppy, the nasturtium, and the ducky marigold are also luminous to a certain degree.


