LAKE TRAFFIC.

Movement Through Buffalo the Largest in History.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 30.—The Eastward movement of four and a half million bushels through Buffalo for the month of November shows an increase of 128,128 barrels of flour and 225,000 bushels of grain, 25,417,200 bushels; increase over last year, 1,000,000 barrels of flour and 50,000,000 bushels of grain. The volume of the grain are the largest in the history of the port.
