WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—There are now quite a number of senators who walked out of the Republican national convention in the city. Senators Cannon, Dubois and Pettigrew are here, and met at the capitol today, but discussed matters only in a general way.

There has been some speculation as to whether the former Republican senators would attend future Republican caucuses, one of them when questioned, said that it would be time enough for him to decide when he was invited to a caucus, and called attention to the fact that notices always are served on Republican senators that a caucus is to be held.

Another senator said that he would not attend any caucus at present, and would await developments. Senator Teller, of Colorado, and Senator Mansfield, of Montana, have not yet decided and it is quite probable there will be no concerted action on the part of silver men until the arrival of the former.

The general opinion of the silver men is that no important legislation can be passed at this session.
