MAZE OF MYSTERY

SURROUNDS THE DEATH OF NELS N. LAWSON, OF GROVE CITY.

MURDER, ACCIDENT, OR SUICIDE. THE YOUNG MAN CERTAINLY CAME TO A VIOLENT END, BUT HOW?

A PISTOL FOUND NEAR HIS BODY.

Letter to His Sweetheart—The Police Incline to the Belief That Lawson Killed Himself.

Nels M. Lawson, a young man whose home is at Grove City, Minn., was found dead at 9 o'clock yesterday morning on the viaduct over the Great Northern tracks at Fifth street and Second avenue northeast.

A pistol with one empty chamber was lying near the body and upon searching the clothes another weapon of the same make was found in a hip pocket.

The young man had been in attendance at Archibald's Business college since his arrival in Minneapolis Oct. 23.

Officer Thomas Collins met Lawson about 2 o'clock yesterday morning near Hennepin avenue and Second street.

Upon inquiring why he was out so late Lawson replied that he had been at a dance at Olson's hall, Washington street and Twelfth avenues south, and was on his way home.

It is reported that a patrolman in that section of the city heard a shot fired at 10 o'clock this morning.

Assistant, Mr. Peterson, who in turn refused to give advice in the matter, referring the deputy to Mr. Childs, the attorney for whose instance the warrant had been issued.

At Mr. Childs's instigation, it is understood, a telegram was sent to the local police at St. Louis, Mo., Sunday morning, instructing the police of that city to arrest Haney if he could be found.

There are those in Minneapolis who believe that Charley Haney steered clear of St. Louis.

Others do not even believe that he intended to go to St. Louis, and there is no foundation for this statement.

That he intended to go to Mexico there can be little doubt. Only a few days ago he was seen in the company of several gentlemen for letters to Senator Knute Nelson to be used by him in an effort to secure the appointment of American consul to the Mexican town in which he should locate.

It is more than likely that he will not be used, at least not for some time. Friends of his are likely to believe the many rumors that have been going the rounds in regard to his irregularities.

He declared that as soon as he hears the warrant for his arrest he will return and stand trial if necessary.

It is not known by those who are prosecuting him that he will ever return to Minneapolis unless he is forced to do so.

They do not expect, therefore, that he will have brought those others who, they allege, have committed crime to justice.

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WAR IN HIS LANGUAGE

SEVERE IN HIS LANGUAGE. HORRORS OF THE SITUATION IN CUBA DEPICTED WITH USUAL FRANKNESS.

ALTERNATIVE OF OPEN CONFLICT. Preferable to Humiliating Delay While Rapine and Destruction Are Rampant on the Island.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Senator Morgan, of Alabama, has the reputation of the senator who will fill galleries for an hour today by his earnest advocacy of a strong and decisive policy in dealing with the Cuban question.

The resolution of Mr. Morgan, which passed the senate today, is as follows: Resolved, That the president is requested, if it is not his duty to do so, to send to the public service, to send to the senate of affairs in the island of Cuba, which are referred to in the report of the secretary of state.

And also a statement of the several amounts of the claims lodged in the department of state by the citizens of the United States against Spain growing out of the alleged insurrection now existing in the island of Cuba.

Mr. Morgan's speech was a masterpiece of directness and severity in picturing the horrors existing in Cuba such as is seldom heard in the senate.

Mr. Morgan spoke freely of the possibilities of war, welcoming it if necessary, to guarantee the protection of American citizens.

Mr. Morgan's views on the line of action, which should be adopted, was summed up in the following: Although I believe that belligerent rights should be given to Cuba, I do not believe as the president prefers a more coercive policy.

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WILL BE RELIEVED

SURFACE INDICATIONS ARE THAT GEN. WEYLER IS TO BE RECALLED.

IN DISFAVOR AT MADRID. PROCEEDINGS AGAINST MAJ. CIRUJEDA HAVE AROUSED THE PEOPLE OF SPAIN.

MARIN SUGGESTED AS A SUCCESSOR. During the Late Interregnum He Acted as the Captain General of Cuba.

MADRID, Dec. 15.—According to surface indications, Capt. Gen. Weyler will soon be relieved of his command as captain general of Cuba.

The report that Captain General Weyler has ordered proceedings to be taken against Major Cirujeda, because the major, after the death of Antonio Maceo, went to Havana without the permission of his superior officers, is causing discontent here, owing to the popularity of Cirujeda.

Gen. Weyler has been in the field against the insurgents, and when Campos was recalled as the result of the dissatisfaction of the Spanish government with his campaign Marin took his place during the interregnum.
