Article VII.—The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall at any time be subject shall be the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00).

Article VIII.—The names and places of residence of the persons forming this association for incorporation are as follows:

F. B. Fargo, Lake Mills, Wisconsin; J. L. Westcott, Grand Rapids, Michigan; J. L. Crump, St. Paul, Minnesota; F. M. Crump, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Article VII.—The officers of this corporation, in whom its government and the management of its business shall be vested, shall consist of a board of five directors, one President, one Vice President, one Secretary and one Treasurer.

Article VIII.—The directors shall be elected annually by the stockholders at their annual meeting, and shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Article IX.—The President shall sign all certificates of stock; he shall be chairman of the Board of Directors and preside at their meetings.

Article X.—The Secretary shall keep the records of the corporation and shall see that the articles of incorporation and the by-laws are duly filed.
