Winnipeg, Feb. 8.—The thirtieth annual report of the civil service commission, covering the past fiscal year, has been submitted to the president. It reviews the growth of the government's civil service, the efforts of the commission to eradicate partisanship in federal offices, and important civil service reforms and extensions contemplated. During the year the commission conducted investigations into charges of political assessments, political or religious discriminations, illegal appointments and removals, and alleged frauds and unfairness in connection with examinations and appointments. In a number of cases charges of political assessments were found that there had been no technical violations of the law. The promulgation of the law on this subject and the commission's warning to employers during the campaign that they could not be forced to contribute to political funds, the report says, had a most salutary effect.

FRANCE IS FIRM. No Change in Her Policy as Regards Egypt.
