If he accepts, the carnival will take place, and will have on the programme contests between Barry and Anthony, "Denver" Ed Smith and Choyanski; Armstrong and Jeffries and Maher and Sharkey.

SAY LEVINE CASE.

Final Decision in Favor of the Land Owners.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 10.—In the United States circuit court today Judge Allen decided the famous Say levee case. The case was argued by the land owners and the Mississippi river in the counties of Adams, Pike and Calhoun under an act passed by the legislature in 1871, and bonds were issued the contractors in payment of which bonds were sold to Francis W. Palms, of Detroit, Mich., and others. The land owners refused to pay the bonds and the case went to court. The supreme court in 1876 declared the law under which the bonds were issued unconstitutional, but Judge Drummond, in the federal court in this city in 1880, in the case of Palms and others vs. the commissioner of the levee district, held the bonds a lien on the land. Palms' executors brought suit to enforce this judgment, but Judge Allen decided the case today in favor of the land owners. There are about 1,000 defendants, and the amount of bonds is \$1,000,000. Interest involved was about \$1,000,000.
