

ENGLAND IS SEVERE

PRESS COMMENT ON THE REJECTION OF THE TREATY VERY CAUSTIC.

WAR CLOUD BLOWS OVER.

ACTION OF THE TRANSVAAL GREATLY RELIEVES THE STRAIN IN AFRICA.

OLIVE BRANCH OFFERED FRANCE.

Opportunity Afforded by the Paris Fire Gracefully Accepted by the Emperor of Germany.

LONDON, May 8.—The rejection of the arbitration treaty by the United States senate has been received with much disappointment here, and many hard things are being said about American politicians.

The speaker explains the defeat of the treaty by the absence of its friends from the senate, and says that the treaty, which only stood in the way of a better one by and by, adds: "We must wait until public opinion has acted on the senate, a very uncertain and lengthy process, or until the Republicans find it worth while to capture the independent electorate."

The Daily Chronicle says the rejection of the treaty as a piece upon which to hang a rabid denunciation of the Marquis of Salisbury's premiership, which it says "represents a record of failure almost unparalleled in the history of England."

Jerome K. Jerome's Today discusses the matter in a similar strain. Great importance is attached to the decision of the Transvaal parliament at a secret session, held at Pretoria, the capital, on Wednesday last, to repeal the Transvaal immigration law.

The Transvaal volksraad at a meeting held to discuss the answer to be made to the dispatches of the British secretary of state for the colonies, Joseph Chamberlain, who demanded a repeal of the law.


The quiet life of the country became distasteful and McCoy ran away from home and went to Louisville, Ky., where he worked as a cash boy in a dry goods store.
