"Let us suppose," he says, "that subscriber A wants to talk to subscriber B, whose subscription number is 2,753. A presses the buttons in the left hole, and the successive numerals appear in order—that is, 2 and 7, the left hole containing only the numerals in the thousands and hundreds. And then presses the buttons in the right hole, and in the like manner obtains the numerals 5 and 3. A has thus placed himself in communication with B's telephone (No. 2,753).

Moreover, it must be remembered that under the Apostoloff system any number of subscribers can be accommodated in one room and without the slightest increase of expenditure. This is a notable point, as hitherto in all large cities the central stations have required considerable room. Thus, in Paris, as late as 1894 (before the Hotel des Telephones was built), the central station was so overcrowded that new subscribers found it impossible to obtain admission.
