

AHEAD OF THE TIME

GREAT NORTHERN CROP REPORTS SHOW GRAIN IN ADVANCE OF SEASON

ALONG MUCH OF THE LINE.

WILLMAR DIVISION REPORTS NEED OF SOME MORE RAIN AT THIS TIME.

GROWING GRAIN DOING NICELY.

Northern and Dakota Divisions Are Reported to Be in Excellent Shape.

The third weekly crop report of the Great Northern, issued yesterday, will be read with great interest by the farmers of the Northwest who are following conditions very closely. The report is fully as favorable as the preceding two and no section reports bad news. A gist of the report by divisions follows.

Willmar Division—There have been a few showers on this division, but the ground is still dry, and more rain is needed. The grain is doing well, however, although not ahead of the season. The cool weather is looked upon with favor as it induces the grain to root better. At Delano the grain is reported as being two weeks behind the season. Waverly reported that late sown grain will likely be thin unless there is rain. Early sown grain is in excellent condition. Nearly all the stations on this division as far as Hutchinson reported the ground getting dry.

Northridge Division—At Willmar the growing grain is said to be doing nicely, but rain would assist materially. The conditions at Kerkhove showed the weather favorable, ground excellent and progress of growing grain ordinary. Murdock reported the weather cloudy and cool with good showers. Eight-tenths of the stations on this division reported the grain from one to three weeks ahead of last season with the ground good to rather dry. Degraff, Benson, Hancock, Morris, Herman, Norcross, Tintah, Campbell, Maynard, Cottonwood, Russell, Florence, Ruthon, Pipestone, Sherman, Sioux Falls, Volin, Yankton, Bellingham, Nassau and other towns reported considerable rain.

Fergus Falls Division—Itasca reported considerable rain during the past few weeks and the grain growing well. The farmers have generally completed the seeding of corn. Wheat along this division is in excellent condition. Several points reported that more sunshine would assist the growing wheat. The grain is not growing as fast as it is on other divisions, but it is healthy and strong. Melrose reported that the prospects were favorable and the ground in excellent condition. Nelson reports plenty of rain and growing grain from five to eight days ahead of the season. Grand Rapids is ten days ahead of the season. At Fergus Falls the crops are ten days ahead, and the grain is strong and healthy. From Princeton to Elbow Lake the same favorable conditions exist.

Northern Division—Thirty-five stations on this division reported crops from ten days to three weeks in advance of the season, and twenty-three reported crops even with the season. Not one station reported grain behind. Nearly all the stations reported the ground either "good" or "fine." The weather during the week was uniformly cool with showers. The report from this division was uniformly favorable.

Sakot Division—The territory covered by this division is about the same as the preceding. The growing grain is in nearly every case ahead of the season or even with it. One or two stations reported light frosts but little or no damage. Aneta reported two heavy frosts. There was plenty of rain on the Dakota division and no dry stations reported the ground too dry.

WOMAN SAYS YES

GENERAL MANAGER OF THE MINNEAPOLIS & ST. LOUIS HAS RESIGNED.

IS GOING TO THE O. R. & N.

HAS ACCEPTED THE VICE-PRESIDENCY AND GENERAL MANAGERSHIP OF THE LINE.

LEAVES PRESENT PLACE JUNE 1.

Declines to Say Anything at This Time as to His Future Policy.

A. L. Mohler, general manager of the Minneapolis & St. Louis railroad, was in St. Paul yesterday and admitted the resignation, printed in the Globe Sunday about his resignation from the M. & St. L., and the acceptance of the vice presidency and general manager of the Oregon Railway and Navigation company, was true. He made the following statement:

"I have resigned my position on the Minneapolis & St. Louis railroad and have accepted the vice presidency and general manager of the Oregon Railway and Navigation company. My services with the M. & St. L. will terminate early in June.

"As to my successor, that is a proper matter for the board to act upon; no definite action, so far as I am aware, has yet been determined, but will be shortly, when the officers of the company arrive here this month.

"The Oregon Railway and Navigation matters, as to policy, ownership and other matters of interest, any expression from me upon that point at this time would be made without knowledge of the situation, and would be decidedly unwise."

Further than that Mr. Mohler would not talk, and the story about his eventually becoming the president of the far off Western line, he had nothing to say. However, it is noted on the best authority that it is true.

HOLLAND TORPEDO BOAT. ELIZABETH, N. J., May 17.—The Holland submarine torpedo boat was launched at the Crescent ship yards, in this city today. The inventor of the boat, John P. Holland, has closely watched the construction of the boat, and he says there will not be any attempt at submarine evolutions for several weeks. The construction of the boat has been eagerly watched by the public, and the boat is cylindrical in shape; is fifty feet long, with four foot screw propellers extending. The diameter is ten feet amidships, and the moulded diameter is the same. The boat can travel under water eight knots an hour and ten knots an hour on the surface. The power comes from a gasoline engine, and a dynamo on board during the trial trip of the boat, but he refused the request. After a trial trip, he says, he will allow an exchange of information with the works of the boat, which, it is believed, will revolutionize warfare. Several foreign nations have bid for the vessel, but it is likely that Mr. Holland will sell her to the United States.
