Legally, Greater New York has begun to exist. Officially, its existence begins Jan. 1 next, although we vote for our next mayor the second day of the coming November.

York will only receive \$15,000 a year. In fact, the total salary list of the consolidated city officials will be \$133,000 annually. For the sake of better administering the local functions of government, Greater New York is divided into five boroughs. Thus the stranger who is within our gates may hereafter visit the borough of Manhattan, the borough of the Bronx, the borough of Brooklyn, the borough of Queens, and the borough of Richmond. The area of Greater New York is 317.7 square miles. The consolidated city has 1,800 miles of improved streets, 1,136 places of worship, 149,000 inhabited dwellings, 166 banks and 6,000 acres of parks. The government of the city is vested in a mayor and a municipal assembly of two houses, all to be elected by the people. The upper house of the municipal assembly is called the council; the lower house the board of aldermen. Twenty-eight members of the board of aldermen are elected every two years, there being 105 members under the present apportionment.

Prehistoric Corn. J. S. Taylor, of Smoky township, Sherman county, Mo., has recently discovered with some "prehistoric corn," the seed of which was taken from a mound near the Mississippi river. Last year the Missouri State Agricultural College planted some of the same seed and the management reported a harvest of 100 bushels of corn, with the growth and yield of this ancient species of maize. The plant is said to be very hardy and grows rapidly, bearing from four to a dozen ears on each stalk. The leaves are very wide, some measuring a foot across, and contain more nutriment than the fodder of common corn. The seed is of a reddish cast and is of the Dent variety. One of the peculiarities of this species of corn is its extensive brace roots at two and sometimes three joints which makes it hard to bow down—Kansas City Star.
