SOUTH DAKOTA AND PORTIONS OF MINNESOTA FEEL IT.

DAMAGE WILL BE SLIGHT.

WINTRY CONDITIONS STILL PREVAIL IN NORTH DAKOTA'S DEEP GULCHES.

Special to the Globe. HENRY, S. D., May 24.—A very severe freeze occurred last night. Wheat is seriously injured, barley and oats nearly ruined.

Special to the Globe. PIERRE, S. D., May 24.—Market gardeners from the Chapelle creek country report serious damage from the frost last night, they being obliged to replant a large part of their gardens.

Special to the Globe. TYNDALL, S. D., May 24.—There was a heavy frost last night throughout the country. Considerable damage was done fruit and vegetables.

Special to the Globe. WATERTOWN, S. D., May 24.—Ice formed nearly half an inch thick last night. Heavy damage was done to all kinds of crops. Shrubbery and gardens show effects today very much.

HURON, S. D., May 24.—The heaviest frost known here for years so late in the season occurred last night. Plums and small fruits were badly injured. Garden stuff was damaged and field crops in many places were seriously nipped.

Britton, S. D., May 24.—The heaviest frost in the year at a corresponding date occurred last night. All kinds of grain was frozen down, but whether damaged much or not cannot be told.

Aberdeen, S. D., May 24.—The thermometer fell to 26 degrees last night and frost severely nipped garden truck. Grain was not injured, in all probability.

Davis, S. D.—A heavy freeze and frost last night damaged fruits, gardens and even the trees were frozen. It was as bad as the frost in May, 1894.

Albert Lea, Minn.—Last night was the coldest for several weeks, and a heavy frost fell. It was probably severe enough to kill fruit, which was all in bloom, but will not affect grain.

Jasper, Minn.—A heavy frost at this place last night greatly damaged all garden stuff and field corn.

St. Lawrence, S. D.—Frost last night damaged early oats and fruit trees.

Miller, S. D.—Ice has an inch thick which found here last night, freezing off advanced vegetation. Wheat was not damaged.
