The Soo on its honor said that it was not in the cutting business at present and that the situation was "normal."

A Northern Pacific official was kind enough to interpret this word "normal" and said it indicated that there was always a little cutting, but that the situation was no worse now than it always is.

The facious official of the Great Northern, when asked who was doing the cutting, said: "It must be the last man who is offered the business."

The Chicago Great Western has reduced the rate on lumber from St. Paul and Minneapolis to Chicago 2 cents, to meet the cut of the Milwaukee road.

General Superintendent Collins, of the Wisconsin Central, advised that Superintendent Horn were in the city yesterday.

The Wisconsin Central now has a rate of 19 1/2 cents on flour to the Atlantic coast, on consignments for export.
