CANOVAS TO STAY.

Queen Approves His Policy.

No Change Will Be Made in the Cabinet Nor in the Course Pursued in Spanish and Cuban Affairs.

BUT GEN. WEYLER MAY BE REGALLED.

His Recall Is Still Being Strongly Urged—Officials at Washington Decline to Talk Regarding the Probable Result of the Policy Decided Upon.

MADRID, June 6.—The queen regent has confirmed Senor Canovas, the premier, in his ministerial powers, and the cabinet will remain in office with personnel and policy unchanged.
